#### FROM THE PASTOR... YOU DO NOT HAVE TO BE GOOD

#### **By Pastor Benjamin**

I was in college the first time I read Mary Oliver's poem, *Wild Geese*. In a poetry class, I read the line, "You do not have to be good." These words struck me as equally repulsive and attractive. Repulsive because I was working my butt off in school to "be good" – good in my classes, good in social circles, good at managing the meager budget I was living on. What do you mean, "you don't have to be good?" Isn't being good the whole point?

But "you don't have to be good" was also a glorious permission to be myself without having to perform or impress. Oliver's poem acknowledges the shared despair of being human, including the despair at never being good enough: "Tell me about your despair, yours, and I will tell you mine." Midway through the poem, she introduces a beautiful word, "meanwhile." We worry and compete, struggle and despair... "meanwhile the wild geese, high in the clean blue air, are heading home again."

This year during Lent we will be hearing some of the poetry of Mary Oliver, who "headed home" in January. Perhaps her poetry can help transform our understanding of Lent from

a season of trying our damnedest to get right with God to a season of "meanwhile." Stepping off the treadmill of selfpreoccupation and comparison to others, perhaps this Lent you might be able to still your nerves enough to notice that "the world offers itself to your imagination, calls to you like the wild geese, harsh and exciting – over and over announcing your place in the family of things."

#### March 2019 Worship

#### Sunday Worship happens 10:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary

#### March 3 – Transfiguration Sunday

On this last Sunday of Epiphany, we gather for multi-generational worship with Holy Communion, Pastor Rachel returns, a jazz ensemble provides Mardi Gras-style music, and Pastor Benjamin preaches a sermon on Luke 9: 28 – 36 entitled "Eight Days a Week?."

#### SEASON OF LENT

For the 40 days of Lent, we will be following the "Poetry of Lent" devotional available in booklet form in the Narthex. We will be guided by the poetry of Mary Oliver, who died in January, and by scripture readings from the Gospel of Luke.



#### March 6 – Ash Wednesday – 6:00 pm



Contemplative worship for all ages in the sanctuary. Come
experience silences, candlelight, readings, and the imposition of ashes – ashes from last year's Palm Sunday palms are placed in the form of a cross upon the foreheads or hands with the words: "Child of God, from dust you have come and to dust you shall return."

#### March 10 – 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday of Lent

Daylight Savings time begins as we start our Lenten series with the story of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness (Luke 4: 1 - 13) and Mary Oliver's poem, "Wild Geese."



#### March $17 - 2^{nd}$ Sunday of Lent

Today we enter the story of Jesus' lament over Jerusalem and hear the Mary Oliver poem "In Blackwater Woods."

#### March 24 – 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Lent

Today our Minister of Music, Rev. Brian Plaugher, preaches on the Parable of the Barren Fig (Luke 13: 6 – 9) and we hear Oliver's poem "Where does the temple begin, where does it end?"

#### March 31 – 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent

Today we receive the One Great Hour of Sharing special offering, Pastor Benjamin preaches on the parable of the Lost (Prodigal) Son, and we hear the poem by Mary Oliver, "Some Questions You Might Ask."



### THE BALCONY VIEW... PREPARING FOR LEADERSHIP

#### **SALT TRIPS**

The season of preparing for our year-end SALT trips is upon us. Our middle school youth will be serving and learning



from communities engaged in food justice work throughout the Bay Area over Memorial Day weekend. Our high school youth will be partnering with, serving, and learning from communities at Standing Rock Reservation in South Dakota from June 21-29. Aren't our young people so amazing?!

Apart from marveling at our amazing youth right at this moment, you may also be wondering why I have chosen to call the year-end mission trips SALT trips. If you weren't wondering, I bet you are now!

SALT: Serving and Learning Together. I believe that serving and learning go hand-in-hand. It is important to learn why we are engaging in service. As our young people prepare for their trips, they will be diving deep into understanding the causes and conditions that have allowed for food injustice to arise. They will be engaging with our country's ongoing history of broken treaties and broken relationships with Native American peoples. By learning from communities who are suffering from food injustice, and learning from our Native American communities, service becomes less of a one-sided affair. Instead, it becomes a partnership.

Lilla Watson, a Murri (indigenous Austrailian) and advocate for indigenous rights has said, "If you have come here to help me, you are wasting your time. But if you have come here because your liberation is bound up in mine, then let us work together." I had our high school youth consider this quote as we were discerning where to go for the year-

end SALT trip. I now leave it for you to ponder. Lilla's quote helps us to see service as less of a one-sided affair and instead helps us to understand service as a partnership aiding in the mutual flourishing of all people.

In preparation for their SALT trip to Standing Rock, the high school youth will be watching the film Smoke Signals, a film about two young Coeur d'alene Native Americans who head off on a road trip. They will be hosting a <u>Congregational Dinner and Movie Night</u> on Saturday, March 23rd! That's right! You will be invited to a wonderful night of dinner and watching Smoke Signals all hosted by our high school youth. After the film, the



youth will help to facilitate a discussion. Please mark your calendars and come out to support our youth!

## LEADERSHIP COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY—JANUARY 2019

*Financial Report*: For the third year in a row, we finished with more cash than we started with. We received approximately 96% of operating pledges. Wider mission pledges, income from facilities and plate collections were higher than anticipated. Expenses were under what was projected in the 2018 budget. There were several factors for the lower expenses. Utility costs were reduced due to the installation of energy efficient lighting being installed and other facility improvements. Personnel costs were reduced due to changes in staff.

**<u>Budget</u>**: The members of the Budget Committee (John Henel, Kathy Bell, Jennifer Halleck, Larry Stallings and Pastor Broadbent) presented a balanced budget for 2019, and it was approved to present the budget to the congregation at the annual meeting.

<u>Associate Minister for Faith Formation Search Committee</u>: The Search Committee is moving ahead with the search process. They will be meeting weekly to create a profile, to be completed by the end of February. The committee met with Daniel Ross Jones from the UCC conference office and received suggestions and guidelines on how to proceed with the search.

**Pastors' Housing Allowance**: The Leadership Council approved that \$50,000 of Pastor Broadbent's annual salary and Pastor Knuth's entire salary be designated as Housing Allowance.

<u>Staff Transitions</u>: Julie Reimer has been shadowing Rachel to observe her duties. Julie will be prepared to assume her role as Children's Ministry Coordinator in February.

*Men's Retreat Contract*: The Leadership Council approved the Men's retreat contract.

**Bylaws:** The temporary provisions that were placed at the end of the revised bylaws in order to adjust lengths of initial terms for Council Officer and Members and Nominating Committee Members were approved to be automatically removed from the Bylaws upon election of the 2019 Leadership Council and Nominating Committee.

**<u>Communication/Announcements</u>**: Possible Leadership retreat ideas were discussed. Further discussion and brain storming on retreat topics and participation will occur in the near future.

*Care and Fellowship*: The Women's Retreat will take place the weekend of January 18-20 at Westminster Woods.

*Facilities*: Church members are planning the Sanctuary beam restoration project. There will be AED training in February, funded by Memorial and Endowment. Numerous closets around campus are being cleaned out. Plans are underway to replace the Media room carpet. Trees near the power lines will be trimmed. Landscaping work is being performed by a team of church members. Gutters have been cleaned on several buildings on campus.

*Faith Formation*: Several wonderful activities are happening, all details in Salt & Light and the weekly bulletins. Recruiting volunteers is an ongoing issue.

*Finance*: See above for the financial and budget report.

<u>Outreach</u>: The Director of Verity expressed came to the January Mission and Outreach Committee meeting to express her gratitude for the gift cards received from the congregation. The Christmas Eve offering was divided between the UCC Christmas Fund and the Nueva Esperanza Church in Mesa, Arizona.

*Personnel*: New personnel are integrating into the staff team and performing well.

*Worship and Arts:* The Christmas eve services were well attended. The guest Handbell choir concert on January 6 was well attended and included several non-church people.

The congregation is invited to discuss these items as well as any other issues, concerns, ideas or appreciations to any of the Council Members.

#### WORLD DAY OF PRAYER **By Chris Jenkins**


