Easter: A Non-Violent Revolution

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

The moveable letter sign on the sidewalk in front of Community Church quips ultra-brief sermons for commuters who drive by on Route 116. The message currently greeting those zooming north reads “Retribution is not a Christian value.” I wish this could go without saying, but many prominent Christians, including politicians, do not blink or blush while invoking retribution, revenge, falsehoods, and calls for violence.

Contrary to this unbiblical view, it is clear to me that the God revealed in and through the birth, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ is a non-violent God. At Christmas we witness a God made vulnerable, born to parents who flee for their lives as refugees. Throughout his ministry, Jesus seeks out the marginalized – exploited fishermen, maligned women, alienated tax collectors, and disregarded children. He describes a world turned upside-down in which the poor are granted favor and the rich are turned away.



Jesus’ death, the “passion story” we tell during Holy Week, is the result of an unjust legal system that scapegoated an innocent person for the sake of maintaining the status quo. Jesus’ crime was living in a way that threatened the privilege of those in power. And they used that power, the power of violence, to execute him publicly as a shameful example to all who might threaten the powers that be. While the cross was a horrible spectacle, the enduring image is of a man who loved until the end – loved his fickle friends, loved his betrayers, loved his enemies.

If the story had ended with the cross, it would have been yet another sad and sentimental story about a remarkable person who struggled to maintain his humanity in the face of state-sponsored violence. But the story did not end with the cross. In fact, the story hasn’t ended yet because on the Sunday morning following Jesus’ crucifixion, some women found the tomb empty. And then people started reporting that Jesus appeared to them. His body was the same but different. He bore the scars of violence, but he came and went peacefully as he pleased.

Resurrection, it seems, is the great vindication of nonviolence. In response to the death-dealing forces of human cruelty and power-hungry empires, God did not respond in-kind. Rather, God reflected humanity’s violence back to us, like a mirror, so that we could see and repent of the ways we resort to violence to get our way. In Christ, God absorbs our violence and puts it to death. On Easter morning,

God raised Jesus as a sign that violence has been defeated by a peace that passes understanding. Now death need not be feared, for new life in Christ outlasts even death. This is the revolution we claim and proclaim through our own lives on Easter morning, and every day.

April 2 – 6th Sunday in Lent / Palm Sunday

Racism In Sebastopol?

The Community Church of Sebastopol, in its ongoing efforts of inclusion and diversity hosted the President of the local chapter of the NAACP, Kirstyne Lange. She spoke at noon on January 22 after church, to a group of approximately 60 people. Ms. Lange shared with the audience the NAACP Branch History along with the Black Community History, and her personal journey and insights.

Reverend Broadbent introduced Ms. Lange and stated, "We are an open and affirming congregation and our mission and goal is to promote diversity and inclusion for all. It is troubling anytime we hear of incidences of prejudices in our community." Benjamin went on to say, "we invited Ms. Lange to share with us, and the community, NAACP insights on dealing with racism, and educating our local community members."

The local branch of the NAACP was founded in 1953 Co - Founded by Platt Williams and Gilbert Gray. Three hundred members were required to establish a chapter. The entire Santa Rosa City Council & the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors were members, efforts were made to address the injustice faced by Black community members. Areas of discrimination were in housing, segregated dining, and shopping. This was common in the 1960s. Lawsuits were brought against Kress & Woolworth. In 1962 – there was a lawsuit against the Silver Dollar Saloon along with a sit-in.

Alliances were built with North Bay labor unions. School boards were lobbied to hire Black Teachers and in 1959 - Melva Joy Patillo (Beals) was brought to Santa Rosa. She was one of the Little Rock Nine. She completed High School at Montgomery High.

Issues today include struggles for Black renters that face the highest housing burden in the county at 68%. Two in four Asian and white households own their homes, double the rate of Black households at 34%. Black residents have a lifespan ten year shorter than other racial and ethnic groups in the county. Black residents have the lowest rate of school enrollment in the county at 69.3%.

Ms. Lange, when asked if she felt there were any serious issues of racism in the west county said, "all issues of racism are serious. We live in an idyllic area, but local racism is a real problem. An off the-cuff comment or a racist joke is no laughing matter. I grew up with this, I know the pain these things can cause." "Local county schools, including two in Sebastopol have had incidences of racism."

Kirstyne has dedicated her life to diversity, equity, and inclusion. As a long-term resident of the San Francisco Bay Area, Kirstyne prides herself on creating policies of inclusion in education, government and law enforcement. She earned a Bachelor of Art in Public Policy from Mills and went on to receive her Master's Degree in Public Administration with an emphasis in Nonprofit Management from Sonoma State University. In the spirit of paying it forward, Kirstyne served on the Mills College Board of Governors advocating for alum and student initiatives in addition to being a founding board member of the Sonoma County IOLERO - CAC, advocating for safer policing and oversight policies. Kirstyne was on the Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion committees for a number of K12 independent private schools and is the founder of KAL Consulting, an inclusivity consulting firm in the North Bay area.

Kirstyne serves as the President of the Santa Rosa -Sonoma County NAACP Branch, board member on the Elsie Allen High School Foundation, the CLEAN Committee, Santa Rosa's Community Advisory Board, Sonoma County Tourism Board, and Community Matters.

Wondering Circle



In Wondering Circle, the scripture story is told in worship (Children’s Message) and then children and adult volunteers walk over to Room 5 for art, prayer, and singing.

Awesome things happen in Wondering Circle! For example...

- On the Sunday we shared an impromptu lectio divina, the children learned more about contemplative practice and shared their insights.
- When we heard the story of Jesus baptized by John in the River Jordan, the children wondered why John hesitated? And then children made art and explored the desert box filled with sand.
- After Pastor Benjamin shared his collection of crosses, the group wondered about the difference between a crucifix and a bare cross.
- Children often create thoughtful art responses to the story they’ve heard, or choose to play with the materials from the day.

To enter into wondering is the process of putting ourselves into the story, into the shoes of someone else, and noticing– noticing what it feels like, what a certain character might be thinking, how we might act if we were in the story. Wondering teaches compassion and inspires hope, through the imaginative process.

A Report from the 2023 Interfaith Faith, Food, and Farms Conference

We represented our church at the Interfaith Faith, Food, and Farms Conference in Oakland last month. Here are our thoughts about what it was like:

From **Garth**: “There were lay leaders, clergy, farmers, food systems professionals, food sustainability advocates, fair labor practice advocates and faith community members, interested in and practicing faith-based food resilience. These attendees included people from California and other States. During the breakouts, I chose to attend Produce CSA and Box Delivery Programs, and Making The Most of Commercial Kitchens, and I gave a presentation on the UCC Sebastopol Commercial Kitchen. After a fantastic dinner, the closing plenary included speakers such as: Hon. Assemblyperson **Lori D. Wilson**, who described the bills she is putting forward to assist farmers, farm workers, and food resilience. **Kelly Moltzen** of the Interfaith Public Health Network. Her organization tracks worldwide food distribution with the objective of solving food shortage and health problems by advocating for fair food distribution. Tim Allison from Seed of Hope, which grows food and distributes it to over 100 low-income families. Overall, it was an amazing event.”

And from **Andrea**: “The conference was such a great opportunity for me, I was pleased to represent! I attended the breakouts: Gardens and Farms on Faith Community Land, and Advocating for Local, State, and Federal Sustainable Agriculture Policy. In a discussion of food insecurity and climate change, I heard **Amos White** say: “The fact that we can’t resolve the problem does not absolve us of doing nothing” There are definitely some things we might be able to check out for a youth outing and learn more about. For example, counteracting climate change by pushing each community to plant 1 tree for every person. The city of San Leandro has so few trees it is considered a desert. Fascinating! I also learned about Urban Adamah in Berkeley - a fascinating use of religious lands, to support a farm, meditation center, a Jewish center, and more. I met some interesting people, lots of them in fact :) I met a pastor in Bellingham, **Emma Donohew**, that is part of Echoes, a Lutheran based church that doesn’t have a brick and mortar and rotates between Pub Church (seriously in a pub), Wild Church (in a park or elsewhere outdoors), Creative Church (doing art), and Service Church. One of the best parts was that they make their own grape juice for communion. This sounded like an amazing project for youth - harvesting grapes and then pressing for juice and then canning it!”


