


What's the Deal with Hell?

Maybe because it's summer, or maybe because a "heat dome" is bringing triple digit weather to many parts of the country, but I've been thinking more about hell than usual. Most likely it's because I've discovered David Artman, who wrote "Grace Saves All" and hosts a podcast by the same name. Artman has been reminding me of some things I learned about hell in seminary:

- There is no concept of hell in the Hebrew scriptures the closest thing is
 "Sheol,"referred to as "the Pit," which is
 where the dead go and where the living go
 - when they feel lost or forgotten.
 Understood as a place of punishment, the idea of hell snuck into Jewish consciousness
- during the "intertestamental period" (420 BCE – 70 CE) through the Persians and Greeks – think "Hades."
- In Jerusalem, hell was a physical place just outside the city walls. "Gehenna" was the city dump where fires constantly burned. Known as the "Valley of Hinnom," it led down into a hot desert inhabited by jackals.



• Jesus spoke of Hades or Gehenna in relationship to the kingdom of God. To receive the kingdom of God was to receive fullness of life. To refuse the king dom of God was to find oneself in a place of hopelessness and death. As Kathleen Norris wrote, "Hell is hearing the Gospel, then not doing it."

David Artman observes that most early Christians did not believe in an eternal hell where non-believers would be imprisoned forever. They believed that hell was a place of correction and held out hope for the eventual salvation of all creation. Despite the modern assumption that, for Christians, all will not be saved, Artman makes a case for "the necessity of Christian universalism." It is not possible, he claims, to affirm all three of the following statements:

- 1. God has the power to save.
- God wants all to be saved.
- Not all will be saved.
- Exclusivism (1+3) believes God can save all but chooses (elects) not to.
- Transactionalism (2+3) believes God wants to save all but can't do it alone
 we must add something like correct belief or good works.
- (1+2) believes that God can save all and wants to save all and therefore will save all.

What's the Deal with Hell? continued...

Theology is our most basic thinking about the nature of being. What we think about the ultimate destiny of ourselves, other humans, and creation itself – our beliefs about whether none or some or all will be saved – is tremendously practical.

- If we don't believe that anyone is destined for ultimate goodness, we may be more likely to look out for ourselves for the time being since that is all we have.
- If we believe that salvation is for an elect few, or only for those who belong to the right religion, or who believe in a certain creed, we may be more likely to support policies that benefit "people like us."
- If we believe that God loves all creation, including all people, and is working right now to bring about a
 final reconciliation or liberation of all things, we may be more likely to advocate for laws and institutions that
 extend resources to as many people as possible, beginning with the most vulnerable.

In this sense, hell matters, not because we must, or even can, avoid hell at all costs, but because our beliefs about hell and salvation in the coming life reveal the ways we are willing to share Jesus' love with those who have visited hell in this one.

August 6 - Guest Speaker: Alan Murakami on "The Uncle I Never Knew"





Youth SALT Trip to Blue Theology



In June, nine of our Youth attended the SALT (Service And Learning Together)
Trip to Blue Theology in Pacific Grove, to learn about ocean ecology from a Christian perspective. Our group learned that one cigarette butt contains 15,000 microplastics and pollutes 150 gallons of water. We also learned that when you take 3 deep breaths, 2 of those breaths come from oxygen produced by the ocean. The ocean is a sacred, life-giving ecosystem where we can witness forgiveness, vulnerability, and resurrection.

"The scripture we chose for reflection is <u>Luke 12:34</u>: Where your treasure is, there your heart will also be.
