Thinking About the End

For Christians, November is a month to do some thinking about the end. After all, the Christian year ends every November on Reign of Christ Sunday. And it begins anew the following week on the First Sunday of Advent. Scriptures this time of year focus on a future that is both foreboding and promising. The judgment of the sheep and the goats. Wars and rumors of wars. The moon turning to blood. That kind of thing.

We do well in November to remember that the word "end" has multiple meanings. It could mean the edge of something physical as in the "end of a road." Or it could mean when an episode of time finishes such as the "end of an era." It could even mean the purpose of something as in "the chief end of existence."

In Christian theology, the word used to refer to thinking about the end is "eschatology." In Greek, eschaton means end. When Christians do eschatology, they think about the end and purpose of humanity, the world, and the whole creation. They also wonder where things are going and why they are going there.

In this season of government disfunction in the U.S. and heartbreaking war in Ukraine and the Middle East, there is a temptation to allow our eschatology to turn tragic. We worry about the future governance of our country, the future sustainability of our planet, and the future integrity of our humanity. Those are all very real worries. Which is why we need to rely on the best Christian thinking to provide us with an alternative eschatology of hope.

In the beginning, when there was nothing but chaos, God's spirit moved over the face of the deep. God spoke and creation unfolded into being. At each step, God looked and saw that it was good. Near the end of the unfolding, when God created the animals of the land, including humans, God looked at all of creation and saw that it was very good. God gave creation purpose and direction, directing the humans to garden the land and care for the creatures. In one of the most beautiful lines of scripture, we hear that "God walked in the garden at the time of the evening breeze."

That was the story of the beginning. What is the story of the end, the purpose, of humanity, the world, and all creation? For Christians, Jesus must be the interpretive key. In Christ, we find that God so loved, and loves the world, that God will not leave us to our own devices, that God chooses to come among us, enfleshed, to suffer what we suffer, and even to die at our hands. But death is not the end, but the doorway to resurrection, to rebirth, to newness of life, and not just for individuals but for all creation.

The final book in the Christian canon is a strange one. No one has ever fully understood the Book of Revelation, but the ending is clear:

A new heaven and a new earth. Death will be no more. Mourning and crying and pain will be no more. A new Jerusalem with gates that never shut. The tree of life whose leaves are for the healing of the nations. The non-violent, triumphant Jesus, says, "I am coming soon. I am the Alpha and Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end." (Revelation chapter 21, verses 1, 4 & 25, and chapter 22verses 2, 12 & 13)

This is a marvelous vision of the end, so different from the ones that currently operate in our culture and in our own minds. But this is the vision we are offered to embrace by faith. We can begin to make it our prevailing vision by praying the final word of the Book of Revelation, an Aramaic word, maranatha, which means, "Come, Lord Jesus, come." Amen and yes!

CHRISTMAS OUTREACH PROJECTS

Christmas Gift Bags for Residents of Sam Jones Hall. Each year, we join with several other groups to fill bags with a towel and items for personal care for the residents of the local shelter for people experiencing homelessness. There are 165 residents and the staff said they really look forward to the gift bags! It IS their holiday. Collecting 165 bags is a big task! Please try to do one or more and ask your friends or family to fill one. Please follow the attached list carefully and bring them to church anytime before Dec. 17, and put them in the Entry Hall. If you would rather donate money, please send it to the church by Dec. 8, so we will have time to shop.

Warm Hats, Scarves and Gloves for the Christmas Tree. This year we want to decorate the Christmas tree in the entry way with hats, scarves and gloves for the youth at SAY (Social Advocates for Youth). SAY works with teens and young adults who are experiencing homelessness. Often they are youth who have aged out of the foster care system and need a helping hand adjusting to adulthood.

Alternative Gifts. If you are wondering what to get your friends and family, let us help! We will have Alternative Gift catalogs available. An alternative gift is a charitable donation designated in honor of someone else. Gift recipients receive a description of the gift made in their name and a card. You can turn in your order at church and pick up your cards and inserts the following Sunday. Here are a few examples: \$6 provides seeds for a woman farmer, \$14 provides food or therapy for a Ukrainian refugee, \$20 provides 30 books for a Donkey Mobile Library in Ethiopia.

On October 6 -8, Presbyterian minister, **Joanne Whitt**, facilitated a retreat entitled, Honoring the Body. 32 women participated on Saturday and 17 spent the night, Friday and Saturday. We were happy to welcome 9 women who were coming to a retreat for the first time. The weather was comfortable under the beautiful redwoods. We got to introduce ourselves by sharing an adornment that had special meaning to us. There was laughter and tears as we learned more about each other through poignant sharing.

We had presentations by **Joanne**, small group discussions and large group share outs. Interesting videos created by Dove soap showed how advertising and the media portray unachievable standards for beauty which can be harmful to girls and young women. The take-aways for me were to be thankful for our five senses and grateful for what our bodies CAN do. Health and emotional well being should be our focus, not our appearance. Think about what we can accomplish at whatever age or condition we are experiencing. We had wonderful examples of 2 nonagenarians in our group who garden for our church on weekly basis.

As with all our retreats there was time set aside for art, games, walks, talks and even naps. This Bible verse was on our pillow with a chocolate, "Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? ...Therefore honor God with your bodies." 1 Corinthians 6:19-20. We concluded on Sunday with a Worship Service featuring communion. Connections were made and fellowship was deepened.
