INTRODUCING LACEY



August 11 will be an important day in the life of our congregation. We will meet the candi-

date recommended by our Associate Minister Search Committee to serve as our full-time Associate Minister of Faith Formation. The Search Committee of eight people has been working on this process since January. They are enthusiastic about the result of their search. I was privy to much of the process and want to share my impressions of the highly qualified candidate, Rev. Lacey Hunter.



- Lacey blends contemplation and action. For a season of her life, she lived in a Benedictine monastery, following the rhythms of the community. She folds spiritual practice into everything she does, even into her work as an activist on behalf of women, people of color, the LGBTQ community, and the planet.
- Lacey balances intellect and creativity. She is a thoughtful theologian and an evocative poet. "As a poet," she writes, "I take great delight in the mundane."
- Lacey is able to hold beautiful aspects of Christian tradition alongside progressive movements as well as aspects of other religious traditions.
- Lacey has lived in both rural and urban settings, appreciating the unique flavors of different settings.

A few more tidbits about Lacey:

- She grew up in Ashland, Oregon and has her Bachelor's Degree from Southern Oregon University. Her Master of Divinity is from Pacific School of Religion (PSR).
- She lives in Oakland, California with her covenant partner, Sharon Fennema, a professor of worship at PSR.
- Lacey is trained in the Our Whole Lives: Sexuality and Faith Program and has experience leading Godly Play.
- She has served in a Presbyterian church as Pastor of Education and, most recently, as Director of Youth, Young Adults, and Outreach Ministries at Epworth United Methodist Church.



THE BALCONY VIEW... A BALANCING ACT By Michael Ott, Moderator



At our July meeting, the Leadership Council was updated on the sanctuary beam repair project. The Facility Committee has been working for over a year to define the scope of the beam dry rot and to request bids from contractors. The Council has already decided to enter into contracts and to fund the dry rot repair and to replace the lower roof of the sanctuary. It is possible that during the beam repair, there could be discovery of more dry rot and other water damage afflicting additional areas of the roof. And a casual glance at the roof now reveals several displaced shingles. A discussion about the condition of the entire sanctuary roof led us to the question of replacing the whole roof. It may be prudent to consider a comprehensive sanctuary roof replacement. This larger project would be delayed in implementing until a funding plan is determined.

The mission of the Leadership Council, according to our By-laws, encompasses five tenets. Two of these are to safeguard the assets (human, spiritual, financial, and property) of the church and to ensure adequate resources to carry out the mission of the church. The Council needs to balance the needs of our beautiful sanctuary building with the resources required for upkeep repair. The Council must be realistic about what we really need and how any decision about the roof will impact our long-term goals.

The Leadership Council will continue investigating and considering whether and how to provide a comprehensive sanctuary roof repair. Options to finance the repair work include a capital campaign, special donations and/or assistance from our denomination, the United Church of Christ, in obtaining a loan to finance the work. Our progress and decisions will be communicated in Salt & Light, and of course all of us would be pleased to receive feedback from you.

In Luke 14, Jesus spoke to the crowds saying "for which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him." The Leadership Council will strive to balance all the needs and assets of our church and act in the best interest of the congregation.

LEADERSHIP COUNCIL NEWS

LEADERSHIP COUNCIL AT WORK—BEAM REPAIR UPDATE

The beam repair project is proceeding! The support brackets for the beams to be repaired have been fabricated. We are ready to submit for a building permit. A pre-construction meeting with the contractors is scheduled for the end of July. It is anticipated that the contractors will mobilize on site on or around August 8 and begin demolition of a portion of the existing roof on both the east and west sides of the sanctuary in order to expose the dry rot on the beams. The beam brackets will then be installed and the roof sheathing, membrane and shingles installed to match existing. The beams will be painted to match the existing color. The beam repair work is expected to be complete at the end of September or Early October.

The contractor will use the Danmar parking lot for construction vehicles and material delivery and storage. There should be little disruption to the daily functioning of church activities.

A big Thank You to the facility committee members who have been planning this project for over a year. Their research and attention to detail has been instrumental in designing the project and preparing for its construction.

NINE-TO-DINE

NINE-TO-DINE IS 9 PEOPLE HAVING DINNER TOGETHER AS A POTLUCK IN EACH OTHER'S HOMES.

Want to share meals and conversation with new friends? Nine-to-Dine is for you!



Q: What's the idea behind Nine-to-Dine?

A: Nine-to-Dine is a way to meet new people you wouldn't otherwise, and to get to know them over a series of monthly potluck dinners. You're

placed in a group of 9 people, and you stay with the same group for the Fall (4 months). Every month, the Nine-to-Dine groups will receive a "Question of the Month" as a conversation-starter. In December, the groups dissolve, with brand-new groups forming in January.

Q: Is Nine-to-Dine biblical? WWJD?

A: Jesus was always eating with people he didn't know and building relationships with them. He would totally join Nine-to-Dine!

O: When is Nine-to-Dine?

A: Groups meet monthly in each other's homes, on the date/time they choose, for four months in a row. Groups run from September-December and January-April.

Q: How will I be placed into a group?

A: You'll sign up to participate, and then you'll be placed in a group. Newer and longer-term members will be mixed, with the intention to place people with others they don't know very well. Some groups might end up having "approximately 9" people in them, but that's okay because Jesus is all about relationship and eating meals, not so much about numbers that rhyme with 'dine.' We will do our best! Also, couples will be placed together-- unless they request to be in separate groups.

Q: What if someone can't make it to one of the dinners at the last minute?

A: There will be an option to sign up as an on-call diner. On-call diners are willing to join a dinner in any group, at a moment's notice.

Q: How do I sign up?

A: Sign-ups will be in early September, for the Fall Program--look for a clip board on the rainbow lectern in the Narthex.

Q: What if I love the people in my group and I want to dine with them again, after the program ends?

The Nine-to-Dine groups are designed to be short-lived, with new groups forming in the Fall and Spring, as a way



to mix and meet and get to know folks you wouldn't otherwise have a chance to spend time with. If you click with people from one of the Nine-to-Dine groups, you can get together on your own, outside of the Nine-to-Dine program, but then it's not Nine-to-Dine, it's church people who like each other sharing a meal (which is great too). The whole idea of Nine-to-Dine is enjoying relationship and food with new people!

More details...


- The first host makes the initial contact with group members. At this initial contact, host inquires about food allergies, and communicates them to the group.
- The role of host changes every month, with each group deciding who will be the next month's host.
- Hosts provide the main course, with everyone else bringing side dishes (appetizer/wine, bread/salad, dessert). The group decides who will bring what each month.
- Participants decide together when their group will meet (bring your calendar to the first meal!)
- Nine-to-Dine is a program for adults.
- On-call participants fill last-minute openings in any group, so that every potluck is full.

PRAYING & PRAYERS



HOW TO PRAY WITH SOMEONE: WISDOM FROM THE VISITATION TEAM

Members of our church's Visitation Team regularly visit home-bound people from our congregation. They listen, share church news, and hold the hands of elders. They also do something very important: they pray. They pray for the people they visit. And they pray with the people they visit. So what does that look like? Here are some words from Visitation Team members:

"I have found that a simple shared prayer like the Lord's Prayer before ending the visit works best. It is familiar, participatory, and a reminder of times when the community prayed together."

"To me, to read some scripture, to give hugs, to ask how their spirit is today, and to just spend time together is so sacred & a form of prayer. Time stops when I'm with the person I visit, not only because I see it makes them happy to have a visit, but it fills my heart with joy to be in the presence of someone who has lived so long, is wise, and loves our church."

As you can see, Visitation Team members often see their whole visiting time as a prayer, and the Lord's Prayer as a way to connect to community.

Anyone can pray with someone! If you're looking for a way to get started, a simple way to sink into prayer is in three parts: **Notice + Savor + Respond**. Anyone can use this form when prayerfully accompanying someone else (or yourself!).

Notice: To listen, paying attention to the person's words but also their whole being.

Savor: To linger over the parts of the person's story that need attention.



Respond: To consider how God is moving in this person's life, and reflect it back to them.

And a fourth part: Rest.

Rest: To let go of the need to know the outcome. Sit in awe of God's divine movement in someone's life. Offer a spoken prayer, silence, or just your presence.

There are many ways to pray with someone, these are just some suggestions to get you started, especially if you feel stuck or unsure of how to begin. The good news is that God is ever-present, and is already going before us to bring hope, healing, and new life!

It's been very rewarding for the men's retreat leadership group to see these events take shape and turn out to be very fun and rewarding experiences, after many years of witnessing the wonderful events that the women's group has taken part in. Our first annual retreat took place 3 years ago in Inverness, a beautiful 50 minute backcountry drive from Sebastopol. Pastor Benjamin was our facilitator at the St. Columba Episcopal Church and Retreat Center, a beautiful and historic building which originally was a mansion and later turned into a chapel and retreat center. Our discussions and activities were inspired by a book written by Richard Rohr, called "Falling Upward", which encourages the reader to contemplate the second half of their lives, it's meaning, future opportunities, and reflections on life and faith. The evenings were spent cooking delicious meals together in the community kitchen and playing music and singing. A wonderful time was had by all!

The second annual men's retreat took place last fall at Westminster Woods, in Occidental. Our facilitator was Spiritual Director, Christopher Huber. He put together a guidebook and facilitated a retreat entitled "5 Habits for Seeking God in Everyday Life". In addition to the group activities and discussions, Christopher asked each participant to spend a good amount of one day in solitude without speaking to each other, but rather hiking, reading, writing,

etc., as a way of promoting contemplation. Afterward, we all had a lot to say! Christopher was a very skilled facilitator and many of us had positive experiences with what we learned during the retreat in the following weeks and months. Westminster was a beautiful place to find God in Everyday Life.

Our third retreat is coming up this October 18-20 and we are headed back to the beloved St. Columba Retreat Center in Inverness. Seniors, homeless, back packers, families,...all are welcome. The Saturday lunch ministry began about eight years ago, initiated by Sebastopol Christian Church. Community Church, United Methodist Church, St. Stephens Episcopal and the Buddhist Temple



quickly joined in; now a hot, free lunch is available every Saturday year round, each church taking responsibility for a different Saturday.

Here at Community Church between ten and fourteen diners sit down to a three course hot meal prepared by a small faithful group of chefs. Tables are decorated, guests welcomed by name and for an



hour out of the day, our guests are served as if in a 5 star restaurant. It is a joyful atmosphere all around. Problems and successes are shared with each other; we rejoice with the good and empathize with the troubles. Resources are shared and encouragement given.



Over the years, we have seen folks find housing, become employed, improve health, successfully deal with addiction and simply feel better about themselves. . . Lifting the spirits of All. It's all about Table Fellowship! We are called to feed and nurture and as we do, we, the servants, are fed and nurtured.

1889-2019—Our church began 130 years ago when nineteen Congregationalists met to form a church in the summer of 1889. In the beginning we leased a former Presbyterian church on N. High St. Our current courtyard bell came from this church.

In 1893 we built our own church at 301 S. Main St. We eventually outgrew the Main St. church and purchased 2 acres "way out of town" on the corner of Gravenstein Hwy N and Danmar Dr.

In 1961 we voted to affiliate with the United Church of Christ and held our first worship service at the new property in the first building completed, which is now Fellowship Hall. The new sanctuary was completed in 1967.

During the past 130 years over 25 ministers have served our church. We will celebrate our 130 year anniversary on Sunday September 15. KINDRED GROUPS & PHOTO DIRECTORIES

KINDRED GROUPS: HOW 'BOUT THEM APPLES!

Have you been wondering what's new with Kindred Groups? Here's the news: Kindred Groups are back, with new energy and sense of purpose, and they're all named after apples.

Kindred Groups are a caring ministry of our church, and every member is placed in a Kindred Group by geography. You don't have to do anything to join a Kindred Group, you have been placed automatically in a group based on where you live. Because we've returned to a geography-based system of organizing our Kindred Groups, if



you were previously assigned a Kindred Group, you may find that you have a new leader or new group. And, if you've never been aware of being in a group before, you will be now! All of the groups are names of apples: Braeburn, Golden Delicious, Pippin, Gala, Granny Smith, Baldwin, Rome, and Gravenstein.

There are 3 expectations of Kindred Groups:

- Usher once per year (minimum)
- Gather socially once per year (minimum)
- Leaders create an avenue to communicate pastoral needs to Ministers.

In mid-August, you will receive a letter from your Kindred Group Leader, (re) introducing themselves, revealing the name of the group you're in, and describing the purpose of Kindred Groups. They'll also be sending you a list of all the other people in your group, so you know who's in your group.

At least once per calendar year, all Kindred Groups will usher a worship service and have a social gathering. These are great ways to meet the people in your group and build relationship-- everyone in the group is encouraged to participate. And, if you have a care concern, your Kindred Group Leader is

someone you can come to, for help finding support. Kindred Group Leaders communicate care concerns to the Pastors. Of course, Kindred Groups may wish to usher and create social gatherings more than once per year, but the expectation is at least once.

Q: Tell me something about yourself that others might not know.






