## RETURNING TO THE (EXTRA)ORDINARY

As many of you know, I love river otters. Among the highlights of my summer was going on an "Otter Safari" with the River Otter Ecology Project to Abbott's Lagoon near Point Reyes. However, truth be told, my family and I saw more otters in Piner Creek behind our home. There were even juveniles whose "peeping" for their mama we could hear even when we couldn't see them.

My summer otter experiences lead to me affirm that the greatest adventures are often found at home and in ordinary time. Our life in Christ is like that: Jesus calls us to look for extraordinary presence of God's Spirit popping up in the ordinary settings of our everyday lives.

As we return to the familiar rhythms of ordinary time beyond summer, we have many extraordinary experiences to look forward to:

- Launch Sunday is September 8, the day we "launch" our 2019 2020 ministry program year. After worship, we will gather for a Launch Lunch & Program Fair so that people can link up with the church's upcoming programs.
- Rev. Lacey Hunter, our new Associate Minister of Faith Formation, oversees the launch of ministry programs for children, youth, and adults *Godly Play* for Preschool thru 5<sup>th</sup> Grade; *Middle & High School Youth Groups* for grades 6 12; and *Bible Studies* and other offerings for adults.
- We will celebrate the **130**<sup>th</sup> **Anniversary of our Church** on September 15, the day our church's first minister, Rev. William Rogers, was called to serve two church's jointly The Green Valley Church and First Congregational Society of Sebastopol. These two congregations later merged and eventually became The Community Church of Sebastopol.
- Newly configured and commissioned Kindred Groups, supported by Rev. Rachel Knuth, our Associate Minister of Congregational Care, will begin building networks of relationship in an effort to build more intimate communities within our larger church community.
- 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> Graders in our *Confirmation Class* begin meeting, including at an Opening Retreat at the Oddfellows Russian River Park home of Russ and Julie Reimer.
- **9-to-Dine** groups will form to bring dinner groups together for the next four months an opportunity to meet and break bread with new people. The next groups will be formed in January.
- The Gratitude + Generosity Team will kick off our 2020 Annual Pledge Drive with the
  theme, "Finding the Way." Our goal will be to encourage generous giving so that we may
  continue our church's ministry programs, mission outreach, facility improvement, and fully fund our new full-time Associate Minister of Faith Formation
  position while retaining our half-time Associate Minister of Congregational
  Care.

Here we go. As we launch our 131<sup>st</sup> program year, remember to look for the extraordinary within the ordinary. If we look, I'm confident we'll find it.

#### These partnerships will:

- Connect staff with the work of the Council and Council with the work off the staff.
- Facilitate effective communication by "keeping each other in the loop" and sharing critical information in a timely manner.
- Consistently clarify the difference between Council governance focus and Staff program focus.
- Facilitate effective collaboration between Council partners primarily concerned with "governance" and Staff Team partners primarily concerned with "ministry programs."
- Provide year-to-year consistency between rotating Council members and more permanent Staff Team members.
- Compliment rather than duplicate efforts.

Partnerships are powerful. A team can pull more weight than an individual. An atmosphere of learning enhances shared values, mutual understanding, and an acceptance of differences. Partnerships are personal. We lean on each other's strengths and get help to mitigate our weaknesses. We are guided by a shared vision and purpose that builds trust. Partnerships are protective. We keep each other from mistakes and missteps.


The Bible has much to say about partnerships. "Iron sharpens iron, and one person sharpens the wits of another" (Proverbs 27:17). "Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." We heard Luke's accounting of the Mission of the Seventy on a recent Sunday. ### PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY



#### **KINDRED GROUPS: DEBUT OF THE APPLES!**




Kindred Groups are a caring ministry of our church, and every member is placed in a Kindred Group by geography. You don't have to do anything to join a Kindred Group, you have been placed automatically in a group based on where you live. All of the groups are names of apples: Braeburn, Golden Delicious, Pippin, Gala, Granny Smith, Baldwin, Honeycrisp, Rome, and Gravenstein.

The purpose of Kindred Groups is to create a network of community within our community. This "community within our community" has happened with Kindred Groups in the past-- except that it happened only in spotty ways. The reorganization is a way to bring that experience of community to the whole church. If you are looking for additional ways to connect with people at church, you might like to sign up for Nine-to-Dine.

By the time you get this newsletter, you should have received a letter in your mailbox from your Kindred Group Leader, introducing themselves and revealing the name of the group you're in, and describing the purpose of Kindred Groups. There are three expectations of Kindred Groups:

- Usher once in the Fall, and once in the Spring (minimum)
- Gather socially once per year (minimum)
- Leaders create an avenue to communicate pastoral needs to Ministers.

#### APPLE PIE EVENT

Apples, pie crust, cinnamon, butter, sugar, and a whole lot of love is what makes the Apple Pie Event at Community Church. This year we had volunteers working in Fellowship Hall making pie crust, coring apples, slicing apples, transferring finished apple slices to pie makers, transferring apple scraps to bins, assembling pies, crimping pies, baking pies, overseeing all the pie stuff, welcoming volunteers, feeding the volunteers. And in Memorial Hall we had volunteers baking pies, cooling pies, packing pies, assembling boxes, labeling clamshells, slicing pies, selling pies, feeding volunteers, and cleaning up over and over again! There were volunteers at the fair, driving loads of pies to the fair, setting up the booth and taking down the booth. There were volunteers setting up and preparing the spaces and there were volunteers cleaning up and packing away apple pie gear.

We had at least fifteen children under the age of 10 helping and at least two adults over 90!

There were friends of Community Church teens, there were grandparents with their children and grandchildren, there were friends who haven't seen each other for years, and those who see each other each year at apple pies. Folks who participate in 12-step groups joined in to make pies and one member of the Uke Stars offered to help out for a bit and three hours later was striding across the campus on a pie errand with a big smile on her face.

At least 200 volunteers signed in to make the Apple Pie Event a success this year, and the Community Church campus was filled with sticky, appley joy for four days. It is no wonder people drive up from Mill Valley just to buy our pies! With so much love baked in, who could resist?

## PARADISE SCHOOL SUPPLIES

After the Tubbs and other fires, people in Sonoma County realized that we all were affected, whether we lost homes or were evacuated, or not. So when Kathy Manchester of our church told her niece, Betsy Amos of Chico, vice-principal of one of the three schools in Paradise that were destroyed, that church members would like to help in some way, she said school supplies in August would be good. The response was amazing. During July parishioners donated literally a carload of school supplies: Costco-sized packages glue sticks, markers, scissors, rulers, bulletin board trim, index cards and post-its, a box of 1,200 crayons, a class set of pencil boxes each filed with supplies, box after box of Kleenex, can after can of handi-wipes, and more. Plus over \$300 in cash!

As a member of the Mission and Outreach Committee, I volunteered to take a road trip and deliver the supplies, then stop to see my daughter on the way back. I met Betsy at her home in Chico, where she and her 7-year old twins helped to unload the car. They were floored by the amount and quality of the items that were sent! Church member Joyce Cox had carefully grouped items in large grocery bags, which made transport and distribution easy. The kids had a ball taking the bags out of my car and lining up the loose items on the fence in their yard.

Last Sunday I happened to see Kathy Manchester at a local winery event. After hugs, she told me how much Betsy had appreciated all that our church had done for Paradise.

The teachers were thrilled with the volume and quality of what was sent. All new, so useable. So, thank you, dear church members and friends, for your love, generosity and caring.



Did you know our Church has a Clothing Closet? Two of our church members, Rachel Melone and Kate MacKillop, noticed that we did, and saw room for improvement. They have worked on the Closet to make it more accessible and to provide items that are most needed.



Here is what they have done so far:

- Purchased white metal mesh bins and black velvet hangers
- Labeled shoes and placed them according to size
- Clothes tops hung according to gender and size
- ♦ T-shirts folded and labeled in a bin
- Toiletries labeled and in separate bins
- Pants/shorts labeled and sorted according to size and put in bins
- Socks/underthings folded and put in bins
- Shelves rearranged to fit new bins

Here is what they are currently working on:

- Install round hanger dividers for hanging clothes to show size of items at a glance
- Place two chalk boards on the front of the closet so people can write their list of needs
- Obtain two more bins for men's underwear sizes S & L.
- Purchase risers for toiletry items to use vertical space available

Right now, we have all the donations of clothing that we need. Rachel and Kate check regularly to see what has been used and what has been donated.

Do you want to help? Rachel and Kate would be grateful for a volunteer at the Closet to keep the door open and be a presence on shower days (Tuesday, Wednesday and Fridays from 9 am – 10:30 am. If you are interested, let our Congregational Administrator Becca Emerson know.

#### WHO'S WHO IN THE PEW: JOANNE MATSON

Joanne Matson is a familiar face around Community Church. You may have seen her ushering in worship, or perhaps she helped you fix a dropped stitch on a prayer shawl. Joanne is quietly busy behind the scenes, making sure supplies are available for communion, helping in the office, serving on several care and fellowship teams, and facilitating the Women's Bible Study. Once a month Joanne joins a small group of dedicated volunteers to prepare and serve a hot meal to all who show up in the Fellowship Hall for Second Saturday Lunch and fre-



quently she assists community members trying to navigate the social services system who end up in the church office looking for help.

Joanne was born in Santa Rosa and has spent much of her life in Sonoma County. Previously a member of the catholic church, she came to Community Church about 15 years ago looking for a place where women were encouraged to express ideas and discuss theology.

After getting her nursing degree (with a minor in Religion and Philosophy) Joanne and her husband, Bruce, lived in Los Angeles and briefly in Eugene, Oregon before returning to Sonoma County. Joanne worked as an ICU nurse until she became involved with the Catholic Worker Movement. She first became aware of the homeless population in Sonoma County when an out of town group of Catholic Workers put on a lunch in Santa Rosa. After speaking with one of the members serving the lunch, Joanne decided to get involved and helped found a Catholic Worker in Santa Rosa. They were very active with those in need, were involved in anti-war demonstrations, worked with clients trying to navigate the social services available to them, and did their best to help wherever they could. Joanne is still involved with the Catholic Worker Movement and considers it to be one of the most rewarding parts of her life.

In addition to the Catholic Worker, Joanne loves to garden, enjoys fiber arts, likes to cook, and enjoys listening to lectures on old testament prophets. Her daughter now lives in Brooklyn and works as a film editor, her son lives in Santa Rosa and is a woodworker, and she and Bruce spend a great deal of time with their three grandsons throughout the year.

You might never guess, but once, long ago, Joanne says that she and Bruce were hippies with long hair, living in their truck. They dreamed of buying a piece of property and living on the land in Oregon, but instead returned to Sonoma County and, over time built their own house in Sebastopol where they now live.



# Director Catherine Butler Will Be Here for a Post Screening Q&A!

"American Heretics: The Politics of the Gospel" is a documentary about an idea that's now such a contradiction in American culture that it has come to feel like an oxymoron, or maybe an M.C. Escher brain teaser: liberal Christianity. I mean liberal in the classic sense (per Webster's: "marked by generosity...associated with ideals of individual especially economic freedom [and] greater individual participation in government"), and I also mean Christianity in the classic sense (the teachings of Jesus Christ). It's far from counterintuitive to point out that those two things actually fit rather well together.

So why is the political face of Christianity in the United States today exclusively, and dogmatically, Republican? Is it because Jesus himself would have cheered on tax breaks for corporations? Or would have embraced New York Times headlines like "'There is a Stench': Soiled Clothes and No Baths for Migrant Children at a Texas Center"? (Oh, sorry, I forgot: Jesus would never have read The New York Times. He'd be a Fox News Messiah all the way.)

The central figure in "American Heretics" is Dr. Robin Meyers, the senior pastor of the Mayflower Congregational UCC Church in Oklahoma City, Okla., who wrote the fearless book "Why the Christian Right is Wrong" and has a singular knack for using words to reveal the bent morality of those who would claim the moral high ground. "The interesting thing about people who say they're certain," he observes, "is then you need no faith." He's talking about those on the right who have transformed Christianity into a closed system, a faith-based version of circular reasoning that reduces the world to two camps: Join with us, or you're the enemy. But Meyers is also referencing what Christianity was before the absolutists got their



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
