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Church in the Wild: Awaiting the Unexpected

By the time you are reading this article, the season of Advent will have begun. Whenever Advent begins in November, it feels like it's snuck up on us, "like a thief in the night," as Jesus puts it. Advent is a time of watching and waiting, of counting time in anticipation of the incarnation, the decisive event in the history of the world, and witnessed by the church, when God's love incarnated in a person born in a stable in a town whose name means "House of Bread."

It is possible that this Advent will feel very different than any other we've experienced. After all, this past year has felt different than any other before it. We will be hanging on to the meaning of the word Advent, which means "beginning" or "coming." If we were ever ready for a change before, this might be the year we beg for it.

I appreciate the recent conversation with church members Joanne Matson, Sharon Fennema, and Pastor Lacey to discern an overall Advent theme and sub-themes for each of this year's Sundays. Sharon crafted the title: "Awaiting the Unexpected: Letters of Longing from the Wilderness." In these days of wavering light, we will be opening our hearts and unstopping our ears to hear voices from the wilderness that can help us imagine how we might go about the business of picking up the fragments of shattered expectations so that we can begin to build, by God's grace, a more just and equitable world. Some of these voices will be the familiar voices of our own culture, including local neighbors, and others will be the strange voices of biblical characters.



On the first Sunday of Advent, Isaiah the prophet picks up a fragment called "Dangerous Hope," the hope that God will show up, will get back in the game, will "come down so that that mountains will quake in your presence." (Isaiah



On the 2nd Sunday of Advent, John the Baptist, from the wilderness, picks up a fragment called "Lonely Peace," the quiet trust that God's kin-dom of shalom will be ushered in by the one who baptizes with holy fire. (Mark 1:8)



On the 3rd Sunday of Advent, Mary of Nazareth sings a song of "Resistant Joy" that imagines a day and world when the lowly will be lifted, the sorrowful will be glad, and captives will be set free. (Luke 1:52)



On the 4th Sunday of Advent, an angel delivers a message of "Foolish Love," that a child will be born who will turn the world upside down to make a way out of no way. (Luke 1:26)

Whether the newness God promises sneaks in like a thief in the night, or eases in like crepuscular light, let's train our bodies, minds, hearts, and souls to await the unexpected and begin putting the pieces back together in life-giving ways.

December 6 – 2nd Sunday of Advent: PEACE – Isaiah 40: 1 – 11 & Mark 1: 1 – 8

Today we celebrate Holy Communion and light the second candle on our Advent wreath, the candle of "Lonely Peace." Rev. Benjamin Broadbent preaches a sermon on Mark 1: 1 – 8 entitled "When Peace is Popular Again."

December 13 – 3rd Sunday of Advent: JOY – Isaiah 61: 1 – 4 & Luke 1: 46 – 55

Traditionally, today is knowns Gaudete Sunday, the Sunday of "Resistant Joy" when we light the third candle on our Advent wreath, the pink one. Pastor Benjamin preaches a sermon on Isaiah 61 entitled "When Joy No Longer Eludes."

December 20 – 4th Sunday of Advent: LOVE – Luke 1: 26 – 38

Today we light the fourth candle on our Advent wreath, the candle of candle of "Foolish Love." Today Rev. Lacey Hunter, Associate Minister of Faith Formation, leads the congregation in an instant pageant open to everyone.

December 24 – Christmas Eve

Today we gather for an candlelight service via Zoom at 5:00 p.m. We'll hear the Christmas story along with carols and handbells, concluding with candles in our own homes and singing Silent Night and Joy to the World.

December 27 – 1st Sunday after Christmas – Luke 2: 22 – 40

Today we continue in the season of Christmas and hear the story of Jesus' presentation at the temple Jerusalem as a baby. In the story we meet two elders, Simeon, who sings a now famous song, and the prophet Anna, who gives the first Christmas sermon.

Balcony View. . . SHELTERING IN A PLACE

The Leadership Council's regular meeting was held on November 18 via Zoom video. Our advent ministry this year is shining a light on the faces of houselessness, welcoming the congregation into a conscious awareness that housing

inequity is happening to good people and that there are ways to help and share with the less-fortunate. Indeed, access to housing and shelter has become a world-wide issue.

As a consequence of the reality of houselessness, the Outreach Committee, led by Peggy Porter, has researched a shelter option that could be built and maintained in our church parking lot. These micro-shelters are named Conestoga Huts. They have been used as a quick shelter option for individuals and couples who are temporarily experiencing houselessness. The huts offer a basic level of security and relief to people in need. These hard-shelled, insulated shelters are inexpensive and durable, capable of being constructed by a group of a few volunteers with a wide range of construction experience. Their modular design makes them easy to be assembled, disassembled, and refurbished, and they can also be transported.



The implementation of Conestoga Hut-living in Eugene, Oregon has demonstrated that these structures provide a viable alternative to mainstream housing options and are a quick way to relieve communities of the immediate need for accessible and stable housing.

The Committee has reached out to the City of Sebastopol to investigate whether the construction of and living in one or two of these Conestoga Huts on church property would be allowed. We have applied for a master planning review and the City is currently arranging a pre-application conference with Planning, Building, Fire, Police and other relevant City Departments. We are hopeful that this conference will be scheduled in early December. If approved, our intention would be to purchase the plans and materials for one or two shelters and invite the congregation to engage in both financial and sweat equity to achieve the construction of the shelters.

This equity-based work, focused and intentional, illuminate core values that shape our congregation and mission. What beauty can emerge from this?



The Leadership Council met for our regular meeting via Zoom teleconference on November 18. A summary of discussions and actions are highlighted below.

Financial Report: The financial report was presented. October ended at negative \$44K. We await the loan forgiveness of PPP funds which is roughly equal to our shortfall YTD. Pledge revenue continues to hold strong for operating funds, but cannot make up for the lack of Facility, Plate and Other Gifts revenue. All Revenue is \$63K below budget YTD. Expenses are below budget, but that is a good thing. When the PPP funds cancel out our YTD negative balance, we still have \$23K in reserves that we can tap. If we average less than a \$12K loss in each of the last 2 months, we could finish the year even.

Budget Update: The Budget committee is working on balancing the budget with the current pledge totals and projected expenses for the coming year. Pastor Ben is in the process of composing a letter to send out to members and Page 4

Advent Week 1 | Hope begins Sunday, November 29

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me. - Matthew 25:35

Advent Reflection: Tattered gloves, outstretched hands, a soul in need, and the gift of hope that comes when someone reaches back. We all reach out in need sometimes and when someone reaches back our despair gives way to hope.

When whole communities lift up those in need among them, the whole community is lifted up. Especially during this advent season of hope and peace and joy and love, let us reach out to those in need among us; let us bring the gift of hope to someone's outstretched hands and the gifts of peace, joy, and love into our community and our world.

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Advent Week 2 | Peace begins Sunday, December 6

"Because the needy groan, I will now rise up," says the Lord; I will place them in the safety for which they long." – Psalm 12:5

Advent Reflection: The image is entitled "Homeless Jesus", a sculpture designed by Timothy Schmalz, a Canadian sculptor and devout Catholic. It depicts Jesus as a homeless person, sleeping on a park bench. His face and hands are obscured, hidden under a blanket, but crucifixion wounds on his feet reveal his identity. The sculpture is a visual translation of the Gospel of Matthew passage in which Jesus tells his disciples, "as you did it to one of the least of my brothers, you did it to me."

Can you imagine Jesus sleeping on a park bench? Ignored. Cold and hungry. No one offering to provide a place for his head. Can you imagine someone sleeping on a park bench today – making it their home - who may have the gentleness, grace and goodness of Jesus? Someone's son or daughter. Perhaps someone's mother or father. Cold

and hungry, with no place else to go. When the needy - humans with sacred worth and dignity - groan, we must rise up and make them safe. Let us be grateful for the opportunity to do so.



Advent Week 3 | Joy begins Sunday, December 13

If you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. - Isaiah 58:10

Advent Reflection: Home is not always a dwelling place that offers shelter from the world. Sometimes it's a place of dwelling in the heart that offers shelter in the world. Sometimes home is a sense of fulness and belonging. Through community media, arts, and education the Poor Magazine Homefulness Project brings together disadvantaged people of all ages, creeds, and colors all around the world.



Silenced voices are heard and the downtrodden are lifted up and celebrated as a light in the darkness. As you gaze at this image, can you remember a time when you were welcomed by just one or many; when your voice mattered and your presence made a difference? Feel for just a moment that sense of unbounded joy in being seen, in being heard, in being welcomed and valued. That is homefulness – the home created when our hearts and souls find acceptance and belonging in the world.

In what ways did Jesus create homefulness for people in His life? In what ways does your family, your home, or communities-of-caring in your life create homefulness for you? How can you help create that kind of homefulness in the life of someone who has been disenfranchised, marginalized, or undervalued and cast aside in your community?

Faith in Action Practice: Spend time exploring these resources to learn from houseless folks about creative solutions to the housing crisis: Poor

Magazine and the Homefulness Project, Youth Spirit Artworks, and Conestoga Huts.

Advent Week 4 | Love begins Sunday, December 20

While Joseph and Mary were in Bethlehem, the time came for the baby to be born, and Mary gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room available for them. –Luke 2:6-7

Advent Reflection: Can you imagine this encampment as a representation of the Christmas Story, the barn in Bethlehem where a manger is the only room available for Jesus to lay his head? Can you imagine that the faces on the mural are angels adoring and protecting Jesus, or perhaps the faces are Mary and Joseph adoring the Christ child?

We wrap our gifts at Christmas to hide the surprise inside. We often wait impatiently for the opportunity to open them. Mary wrapped the most special gift of all – Jesus – keeping him warm and safe. When we unwrap the love of Jesus, we open our capacity



to give to those who need our care and generosity. Our gift bags will brighten the season of the Sam Jones residents who receive them. The apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians that there are varieties of gifts, but from the same Spirit. There are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. God blesses our giving, service and activity through the gifts we bring to those in our community. It is our unwrapping of Jesus's love and care for the benefit and blessing of those who need them.

friends of the church describing where we stand with the pledge drive and the budgeting process. It is the hope that the letter will encourage people to increase their pledge or make a pledge.

Employee Handbook Policy Change: Pastor Ben reported that churches are exempt from participating in unemployment insurance. Council approved the motion to add the following item to "Termination of Employment" section of the Employee Handbook: "Churches are exempt from the requirement to pay unemployment taxes in California. Therefore, employees who are terminated are ineligible for unemployment benefits."

Burbank Heights and Inter-Church Food Pantry Boards: Pastor Ben reported that the church is affiliated with and has members on both the Burbank Heights and Food Pantry Board. He recommended that the Bylaws of each of those organizations be reviewed to make sure that they are being followed and to provide accountability. It was agreed that Pastor Lacey and Joyce Cox will contact Nancy Shimetz (nominating committee chair) to reach out to and check in with the current board members from our church.

Care and Fellowship: Pastor Rachel is making sure that her teams and committees are covered while she goes on her Sabbatical leave.

Facilities: The commercial ovens and heating systems have been repaired in Memorial Hall. Tree limbs threatening the roofs in Fellowship Hall and our school have been trimmed. Gutter cleaning will start this month. Health and Safety will meet again in January. A work day was held on November 7 to remove overgrowth on the east side of the church. Homeless debris has been removed. Several new volunteers have committed to helping on grounds projects a couple times a month. We are very grateful for this assistance.

Outreach: A master planning application for the Conestoga Huts Project was sent to the City of Sebastopol. The various departments are reviewing the request and have set up a zoom meeting with the church on December 1.

Faith Formation: Another Safe Church Training will be held on Saturday November 22 from 1-3 PM on Zoom.

Personnel: The Personnel committee continues to search for a new bookkeeper.

Faith Formation: Putting Advent Into Practice

This Advent and Christmas season, we will spend time listening to, learning from and journeying alongside different voices in the wilderness — the voices of ancient prophets like Isaiah, John the Baptist, and Mary, as well as the voices crying out in the wilderness today. This year's Christmas Bag Giving supports residents at the Santa Rosa Samuel Jones Hall Homeless Shelter by providing folks with resources for basic needs. Through this practice of giving, we are invited to take up our commitment to "put our faith into action" by paying attention to the voices of our kin who are experiencing houselessness, offering mutual aid, and deepening our awareness of the housing crisis and how we can participate in creative solutions.

The Outreach Team, in collaboration with Faith Formation ministries, has put together a series of Advent meditations to accompany us in this important ministry this season. Every Sunday night in Advent, you will receive an Advent Practice email that will include reflections about houselessness in biblical and modern times along with a weekly faith in action practice. You can also find these weekly meditations in this newsletter. These offerings are for you to engage with how you feel called. You may wish to use them as guides for a daily advent candle practice at home. You may wish to invite others to join you in conversation and action. However you participate, we hope these meditations will nourish your spiritual life this Advent and draw you nearer to the presence of God among us. Thank you to Laura Phearsal and Mike Ott for crafting each of the Advent Reflections that are part of the meditations, and to Joyce Cox and the Outreach Team for organizing this ministry opportunity and partnership.

One of the faith in action practices is to put together a Sam Jones Christmas Bag.
