2020: COMING INTO VIEW

The year 2020. Can you believe it? Here at the beginning of a new year, of a new decade, we might discover a rather obscure Christian holy day that used to be more important than Christmas.

In the first three centuries of the Christian church, the third most important day of the calendar, after Easter and Pentecost, was Epiphany, the Feast of the Incarnation, on January 6. Epiphany signified several things all at once:

- 1. Birth of Christ Early tradition held that Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit on the same date as his eventual death, believed to be April 6, and that his birth happened 9 months later on January 6.
- 2. Arrival of the Magi A tradition maintained in parts of Latin America, gifts are given not on Christmas but on Epiphany, el Día de los Reyes.
- 3. Baptism of Jesus With no nativity story, Mark's Gospel claims that Jesus' public life begins at his Baptism by John in the Jordan River.
- 4. Miracle of Cana According the fourth gospel, Jesus' ministry began at a Judean village wedding with the first of several "signs," the transformation of water into wine.
- 5. New Year For some early churches, Epiphany was the beginning of the church year, marked by reading the first words of one of the Gospels.

The common meaning in all of these is the beginning of the manifestation of God's power, light, and love in the person of Jesus Christ.

As we enter a new year and decade as a congregation, we might reclaim some of the meaning of this ancient season. The word "Epiphany" comes from the Greek meaning "to shine forth" or "to come into view."

- What will "shine forth" in the coming year? Personally, politically, economically, environmentally, theologically, this has been a challenging time in the life of our nation and world. How might we as the church be witnesses to the inbreaking of a new way of being, of the power of God's love made manifest for the well-being of all?



Many people's holiday will be a little easier, merrier and warmer because of your generosity!






