W.I.L.D.: Crisis & Resource

This fall, as "Church in the Wild," we have followed the Exodus story...



⇒from Moses' shoes-off encounter at the burning bush to the precarious slog to freedom across the Sea of Reeds;

⇒from the light, flaky "wonder bread" that appears just in time for breakfast to the instant water fountain at the base of Mt. Sinai;

⇒from Aaron's earrings-to-calf idol-fest to a fleeting glimpse of God's backside.

"What a long, strange trip To guote the name of the Grateful Dead's second album, it's been." – The Grateful Dead "What a long, strange trip it's

been."

Using "WILD" as an acronym, one can identify four crises that we humans are facing today that the Hebrew people experienced in some form during their sojourn in the wilderness long ago:

W – White Supremacy, the often unacknowledged ideal of "whiteness" that creates and maintains systems and policies. Hebrews suffered under "Pharaonic Supremacy," a system in which one people existed to serve another people.

- Illness in light of a global pandemic that has killed over a million people globally, divided people ideologically, and disproportionately affected the most vulnerable. In the Book of Numbers, the people are afflicted by snakebites until Moses puts a snake on his staff and holds it up, a prototype for the modern symbol for medicine.

- Leadership has failed in our own country and others as partisan interests, demagaguery, and narcissism overshadow the common good. Aaron fails as a leader when he succumbs to the people's impatient demand for a God who will serve their needs now.

Destruction of Environment felt here in Sonoma County in the form of 2 destructive wildfires (so far) this year. Israel learns that when they trust the land to provide, there is always enough, but when they hoard provisions, the land suffers, and the people along with it.

But wilderness isn't just a place of crisis. It is also a place of new resources:

 W − Wonder expressed by Moses at the burning bush opens up his imagination to the possibility of liberation.

Initiative at the Sea of Reeds, according to Jewish Midrash, practiced by certain Israelites who wade into the waters trusting that it will part before waiting for proof. Page 1

Here in the WILD are resources from God we didn't know existed.

November 8 – Gratitude Sunday – Matthew 25: 1 – 13

Today we celebrate God's generosity and the pledges made in support of our congregation's ministry and mission in the coming year. Rev. Benjamin Broadbent, Lead Minister, preaches a sermon on the Parable of the Bridesmaids entitled: "No Zero Sum Game."

November 15 – 24th Sunday after Pentecost – Matthew 25: 14 – 30

Today Rev. Lacey Hunter, Associate Minister of Faith Formation, preaches on the Parable of the Talents a sermon entitled: "No One Is Worthless."

November 22 – Reign of Christ / Thanksgiving Sunday – Matthew 25: 31 – 46

We hope you'll join us for one or both of these opportunities to sink into prayer, bringing to God our worries and anxiety, and possibly our voices of resistance and cries for peace. The Good News of the Gospel is that God is with us, Emmanuel, in these times of anguish as we face the unknown. God is present with us, and we can be present with each other as we pray. Balcony View. . . SAFEKEEPING

The Leadership Council's regular meeting was held on October 21 via Zoom video. One important agenda item was the discussion of our evolving and increasing attention to what it means to be a safe church. We are in the process of assembling a team to review our current Safe Church Policy. As part of this work, Pastor Lacey and our Council Member for Faith Formation Larell Fineren continue to train the leaders of our church's children's and youth ministry programs with an interactive class that focuses on understanding power dynamics between leaders and vulnerable people, practices for creating consent culture and capacity building for open communication.

On the cross, Jesus cried "into your hands I commit my spirit." William Barkley points out that this prayer from Psalm 31 was the first prayer that every Jewish mother taught her children, and suggests that this prayer could very well be a prayer Mary and Joseph taught Jesus as a young boy. Adam Hamilton writes that the Greek word we translate as "commit" means "to entrust to someone for safekeeping." We all have a need to trust in our safekeeping, especially when we feel scared, confused, uncertain, exhausted or vulnerable.

Our church is called to be different from the world around us where disrespect, abuse and neglect are common, where certain people are devalued, marginalized and taken advantage. Jesus spoke of us as salt of the earth and the light of the world, believers who will strive to treat all with love, dignity and respect.

In 1 Corinthians, Chapter 12, Paul proclaims that "We are one body, the body of Christ." He continues, "The members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor." We need to actively care for each other and pursue healing and wholeness.

Community Church continues our commitment to make safe the vulnerable in our congregation, community and world. I appreciate Pastor Lacey and Larell for their efforts to move our Safe Church Policy forward. If any of you want to join in, please contact either Lacey or Larell.

LEADERSHIP COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - OCTOBER 2020

The Leadership Council met for our regular meeting via Zoom teleconference on October 21. A summary of discussions and actions are highlighted below.

Financial Report: The financial report was presented. We ended September at \$36K over budget. Pledges remain solid with Local Church pledges being close to 100% of budget. Lower revenue from Facilities and Plate/Other gifts account for most of the shortfall. Expenses are 94% of budget. We have submitted final loan forgiveness paperwork to realize the \$43K of PPP funds as actual income. We have not tapped into the \$23K of reserves allocated for the 2020 budget.

Budget Committee Update: The budget committee is making progress. Forms will be sent out to Council members to request budget needs from all the ministry area teams and committees.

Council Meeting Attendance: An updated policy was presented and approved outlining guidelines for posting our monthly agenda and provisions for how members can attend and contribute to Council meetings.

Conestoga Huts: Council approved signing a Master Planning Information Form to submit to the City of Sebastopol to continue the process of gaining approval for purchasing and placing two Conestoga Huts in the parking lot at the church.

Pastor Rachel-- Going On Sabbatical

Dear Friends,

After five years of ordained ministry in your midst, I am so pleased and grateful to be engaging in a sabbatical. Many thanks to the Leadership Council for approving it way back in February, and for their understanding with the delay in scheduling it due to the pandemic. For many months, I have felt challenged to find "the right time" to schedule a leave with so much happening in our world and in the life of our church. I was worried when school started that having four

children home for distance-learning might mean I would need to use my sabbatical to support their learning (admittedly, not an ideal way to caretake a sabbatical, as the time is intended for a combination of rest and focused study). But the dust has settled and our family has found a rhythm. And, the ministry teams I work with are also finding a pandemic rhythm. So, in conversation with Pastor Ben, Pastor Lacey, and my Leadership Collaborator Bobbie Johanson, a clear sense of timing has emerged, and I am planning to be on sabbatical from November 23-January 4th.

During this time of study leave I intend to learn more about grief work with families by taking webinars, watching youtube talks, and doing some intensive directed reading. My hope is to gain more perspective and skills to bring back to my work in the new year, in service to grieving families in our congregation.




And perhaps you already know this, but all three of your Ministers are eligible for a sabbatical after five years of Ministry with the Community Church, as stated in our Letters of Call. For full-time clergy, this means a 12-week paid sabbatical. Since I'm half-time, I will be away for 6 weeks. As the first of your three clergy to take a sabbatical at our church, I hope I can do right by the process!

I'll be working in the coming weeks to make sure the teams I work with are well supported in my absence. If you have any questions or want to talk more, please don't hesitate to reach out. Even as I look forward to some focused study time and rest, I am already looking forward to seeing you again when I return in January.

Wine Tasting Experience



Games Night



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Faith Formation Ministries: Formed for Collective Care

As we head into November 2020, as we face whatever unfolds in and after the elections, and the winter months during a global pandemic, I find that I am reminding myself daily to turn my attention to the ways we can truly, deeply care for one another. There are remarkable, inspiring opportunities arising from this mess, including growing movements of mutual aid, just redistribution of resources and calls for equity. I want to share one particular practice of care that we are turning our attention to at Community Church.

In 2017 Community Church adopted our "Safe Church Policy." This policy is about creating a church community where everyone is safe from harassment and abuse. At the heart of this policy is the safety of those most vulnerable, including children, youth and vulnerable adults. These kinds of policies exist in many churches, across all denominations. It is one of the main ways we put our faithful care for one another into action.

The training was hosted on Zoom, facilitated by Larell Fineren, Council Representative for Faith Formation and myself, and was attended by nine children's and youth ministry lay leaders.

In this training we explored these three key elements for cultivating a Safe Church:

- Understanding power dynamics between leaders and vulnerable people
- Grounding our ministries in principles of consent culture
- Building capacity for clear, open communication

One of our main goals in these trainings and of this policy is to help us all co-create a community that honors one another's bodies and spirits, a community that is responsible for the wellbeing of the whole.

Consent Culture

- Allows people to take ownership of their own body
- Does not assume anyone is okay with something
- Supports development of inner voice by recognizing and discussing feelings
- Takes everyone's opinions into account
- No means no. Have clear boundaries and rules.
 Follow through when you set limits.

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Church Youth Service Project at Ragle Ranch

On Saturday, October 17, eight youth and 3 adults worked with Ranger Michelle Karle at Ragle Ranch Sonoma County Regional Park. Instead of a zoom meeting this was an in-person, hands-on activity organized by Pastor Lacey. Our task was to shovel redwood chips from a huge mound in the parking lot into wheelbarrows and distribute the chips around oak trees. The idea is to mulch the area out to the dripline of the tree to protect the soil from getting too packed down by foot traffic and allow the roots to grow.



Ranger Michelle provided water and granola bars for us as well as gloves and tools. We started at 9 a.m. when it was a nice 72 degrees. We all wore masks, got our temperatures taken and did pretty well at keeping socially distanced. She also taught us about the different oaks in the park including valley, live, and black oaks. She showed us how different the acorns are from the different varieties. We got to see a woodpecker making a hole to stash another acorn in a branch of a tree that looked like it had thousands stored there already.

We mulched around a very large tree and several young trees. When we finished at noon it was a toasty 86 degrees and the chip pile was greatly diminished. The ranger was very pleased with what we accomplished in the heat and would love to have our group come again. Our age range was 11 to 16 years and on up to 70. We finished with a prayer of thanks for clean air, healthy bodies and most especially the opportunity to be able to gather together to do some good in our community.



Pray Their Names: Our church was given an opportunity to caretake and display a visual art installation called "Pray Their Names", an honoring of people of color killed by police violence. After discussion, Council agreed that they need more time to lay some groundwork and explore ways of getting more people involved, both from the church and the community, with the hope of presenting the installation in the spring.

Pastor Ben Letter of Call: Pastor Ben requested that the format of his letter of call be revised to match our current format that was used for Pastor Lacey's call agreement. The terms of the call agreement were not changed. The revised letter of call was approved.

Safe Church Policy Task Force: Work is planned to update our current Safe Church Policy. Training is ongoing for leaders of our church's children's and youth ministry programs. Feedback from the training sessions will inform how we will go about creating a task force to update our Policy.

Gratitude & Generosity Team Update: The G&G Team has a phone call evening planned to call people who have provided a pledge in 2020 but have not yet pledged for 2021, as well as thanking people that have already pledged. We currently have received pledges from 43% of our households with a total of \$213,645 for local ministries; 57% of the 2021 requested budget.

Marketing Team Update: The Marketing Team is making progress. They have formed three separate teams: Process Team, PR/Social Media Team and Design Team.

Ministry Staff Update:

- M Pastor Lacey Fourteen of our youth participated in outdoor projects at Ragle Park. Future events are planned.
- Pastor Rachel Noonday prayers, Kindred Group in-person gatherings and game nights are happening. Pastor Rachel will be on Sabbatical from November 23, 2020 thru January 4, 2021. She will be doing deeper work on grief and how it affects our lives. She is currently making home visits and phone calls. The Congregational Life team is offering several opportunities for connection such as game night, bingo, book study, blessing of the animals, wine tasting, soul friends phone calls, and a spirit walk around the church campus.
- M Pastor Ben − Pastor Ben would like to have more discussion regarding the roles of the Council members and their ministry areas. It was agreed to do this in February after new Council members are appointed. A hiring committee has been formed to find a replacement for Julie Reimer, our departing bookkeeper. Minister of Music Brian Plaugher's last day will be October 25.

Facilities: Several projects are happening including painting in the Fellowship Hall Kitchen and improvements to the Fellowship Hall storage room.


Outreach: The Outreach Committee is getting ready for Christmas projects. There will be Alternative Gift Catalogs and Christmas gift bags for the residents at Sam Jones Hall. The Safe Parking program is going well. We currently have five safe parking guests. Some of the guests have requested to use the kitchen in Fellowship Hall. It was decided that this would be a decision made by Staff.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED



The Community Church of Sebastopol is a "5 for 5" church, which means that, in addition to basic support of the wider settings of our denomination, every year we receive the four special offerings of our denomination, the United Church of Christ.

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities.
