# Sharing God's Dream

dvent is a time of preparation. But what are we preparing for and how do we  ${f A}$ do that preparation? Yes, we are preparing for Christmas, but if we're honest, Christmas is a mostly secular holiday in the 21st century, and most of our preparation involves buying and wrapping gifts, cooking and eating food, planning visits and seeing family members. Is Advent more than that? Can it be more than that? For most of Christian history, Advent was less about preparing for Christmas – the First Coming of Christ – and more about preparing for the Future Coming of Christ, the fulfillment of expectations of "God's will done on earth as it already is in heaven." But how does one prepare for such a far out, lofty, glorious expectation?

In his book, "The Secret Message of Jesus," Brian McLaren suggests we need new alternatives to the metaphor, "kingdom of God" because of the patriarchy and hierarchy linked to the idea of a kingdom. Are we really waiting for a dominating male ruler to come back and make everything right? McLaren suggests we should learn to speak not only of the kingdom of God, but of the dream of God, the revolution of God, the mission of God, the party of God, the network of God, the dance of God.

This year our congregation will focus on "Sharing God's Dream." We will hear the dream-stories of the Bible, the visitations of Gabriel to Zechariah and Mary, the dreams of Joseph and the magi, and the visions of Simeon and Anna. And we will engage our imaginations:

- What do those dreams and visions tell us about Gods' dream for the world?
- What are our dreams and ow do they link up with God's dreams?

How do we share God's dream of a renewed church and world in an age of anxiety and loss?

A song by Brian Sirchio, "Dream God's Dream," voices the longing of God's people to realize God's dream for the world:

Dream God's dream, Holy Spirit, help us dream Of a world where there is justice and where everyone is free To build and grow and love And to simply have enough.

The world will change when we dream God's dream.

Yes. Advent is much more than preparing for the Christmas holiday. It is tuning our imaginations to dream God's dream and to share that dream with all who hunger and thirst for a changed world where everyone is free.



### Book Release: A Conversation and Celebration! An afternoon with author Rosemary Manchester



Our church community is thrilled to celebrate our very own author, Rosemary Manchester, upon the release of her new book, Turn Left at the Big Anthill. This beautifully crafted memoir tells the story of Rosemary's time in the (Belgian) Congo with four small children, where she and her family served as missionaries from 1958-1963.

If you haven't yet read her book, here are a few sentences to get you hooked, as Rosemary experiences God calling her to become a missionary:

"I went about my chores. I cleaned up the kitchen, carried dirty clothes to the basement,

and loaded them into the washing machine. I made the beds, picked up clothes, settled arguments, wiped noses, made peanut-butter-and-jelly sandwiches. I felt again an

ones we would take with us to Africa and which ones I would give away. I ironed Stewart's weekly allotment of eight white shirts, two for Sunday, a fresh one for the evening service. Every so often I did a sort of inner check, and yes, the voice was still there inside me."

And, after arriving in the Belgian Congo, the country fought and won independence from Belgium. This changed the landscape of the country, which Rosemary and her family felt in very immediate ways:

"In 1957, we'd pledged the United Methodist Church that we would serve the Congolese people for five years. We were thirty years old with four small children. We lived in a big old house in an industrial city in the Katanga Province. With Independence, ancient tribal rivalries erupted. People rioted in the streets, attacked each other with machetes and bicycle chains. United Nations soldiers patrolled day and night. The schools closed. The shops closed. This was no longer a good place to raise a family. The Powers That Be, safe in New York, were neither generous nor merciful. God's will, they said, that we stay the course."

Pastor Benjamin will be in conversation with Rosemary Manchester as they discuss her memoir on Sunday, December 5 at 2:00pm in the Sanctuary. ### **LEADERSHIP COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - October 20, 2021**

Present: Pastor Ben, Pastor Rachel, Robert Curtis, John Henel, Kathy Bell, Tom Terry, Linda Roa, Joyce Cox, Kathy Matthies, Larell Fineren and Chris Chang Weeks.Pastor Lacey was absent

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Robert Curtis. Pastor Rachel opened with a prayer.

On October 22, Pastor Ben sent an email requesting that Stuart and Olive Wilson be reinstated as members of The Community Church. Robert Curtis proposed the motion that Stuart and Olive Wilson be reinstated as members of our church. MOTION/APPROVED by email vote: To reinstate Stuart and Olive Wilson as active members of our church.

Bob asked the council members to review and agree the agenda topics and times. This was done and no changes were made, so we proceeded with the meeting. Approval of Minutes: M/P Larell to accept the October 20, 2021 minutes.

**Financial Report:** John reported that we ended October with a negative result of \$32,884. Local pledges are still coming in strong. Wider Mission pledges are under budget. We have not used any of the authorized \$64k in Reserve funds. Chris added that there were some recent Facilities payments received that are not reflected in this report. Plate and Other gifts are well beyond budget. We are spending less than expected at 97% of budget. The approximate amount of \$53K in FICA funds that we are expecting has not yet come in. Those funds would get us closer to a positive close of the 2021 year.

training offered through the Conference.

Pastor Ben reported that he attended a Farm Worker Rally at Simi Winery to encourage the winery to participate in the protections being set up for farm workers during fire season.

**Liability Decision:** Pastor Ben and Chris reported that they are in contact with our Church West agent about the liability issue for small groups that meet at our church. There is currently a policy that requires a Certificate of Liability Insurance for \$1,000,000 with the church named as an additional insured for groups meeting at the church. This is too costly for small groups. It is the hope to bring a proposal back to Council that identifies the small groups as being part of our ministry and hospitality and thereby covered in our overall policy.

**Budget Team Discussion:** John reported that most of the Budget numbers are in. Budget team members are John, Robert, Kathy Bell and Pastor Ben. If all the requests made by the various areas are granted, we will be \$100k short of balancing the 2022 budget. John presented a spreadsheet with possible solutions on how to reach our goal. Some of the suggestions were:

- Exploring way to increase Revenue
- Use Reserves from the Endowment funds
- Reduce staff
- No Raises

After breaking into small groups, the general consensus was to use Reserves. Nobody wants to reduce staff or cut programs at this time. We need to encourage new membership and continue to be an active and vital church to attract that. This discussion will continue and hopefully new pledges will come in. The plan is for the Leader-ship Council to present recommended options to the congregation in December before the Annual Meeting in January.

**Behavioral Covenant:** Pastor Rachel shared that she and Robert are hoping to create a Behavioral Covenant for our congregation. She passed out some information from the UCC document entitled "A Sure Foundation". Within the document there are samples from other churches about forming a covenant for our church. There are guidelines on how to communicate with each other, resolve conflict and hold each other accountable to that covenant. Kathy Bell volunteered to be a part of a team creating the document. The team will come up with a covenant to present to the Council for approval.

### **Highlights or Quick Updates:**

- Zero Waste Kiosk will hopefully be installed in December.
- Women's Retreat will be selling wreaths and See's Candy
- Mission & Outreach will be putting together gift bags for the Sam Jones homeless Shelter. They will also be collecting mittens and hats.
- Larell shared that the O&A Webinar on Tuesday (11/16) was very informative. The plan is to make it available for congregational viewing and discussion.
- On December 5th, Rosemary Manchester will be discussing her book "Turn Left at the Big Anthill". Reception to follow.
- Joyce reported that there one of the Conestoga Huts is occupied!

The congregation is invited to discuss these items as well as any other issues, concerns, ideas or appreciations to any of the Council Members.

The program was a series of workshops, designed for our church community. Each gathering began with a brief stretch in our chairs, and sometimes a song. We shared group agreements of respect, for how we wanted to be together in a group. We had time to journal and talk together in partners, as well as in the large group. At one point we brainstormed all the things we "relish" about the age we're currently in.

One of the activities we engaged in was the creation of a life map. A life map is a drawing of a person's life path so far, a way to look back and see where they've been. Here is an example of one participant's life map, which was made using collage:

As a group, we shared our life maps and wondered...

- Where do you see God's movement, or where have you felt God's presence along the way?
- Are there past hurts that are calling you to release, forgive, or breathe through?
- Are there principles or values you hold, that are reflected in your map so far?



Our guiding scripture was Ezekiel's vision of water flowing from the temple, making all things flourish, creating abundance and multiplying fish (Ez 47:1-12). In worship after the program ended, in recognition of the work this cohort has begun, the Pastors presented them with a symbol of re-attire-ment (the base of the word "retire"): a face mask with fish. So if you see someone with a face mask with lots of fish, let it remind you-- This person is someone who is reflecting on the questions of aging. This person is curious and growing. This person is wearing new attire as, in Christ, their life's work transforms and renews them, our church, and the world.

I learned a lot walking beside this amazing group of people for four weeks. I hope there will be more groups like this in our church in the future, and look forward to how our older adult ministry program might grow.

# Pledge Drive Redux: How'd We Do?


