As I Look Around This Boat

Excerpt from June 20 Sermon:

Historically, the church has been described as a boat. The symbol of the ecumenical church is that of a boat with a cross as the mast. The main section of a sanctuary, which often looks like a ship turned upside down, is called the nave, as in, you guessed, Navy. Here we are in a boat, the church, and it feels a bit like we've been tossed about and battered by a great storm. We are now, it seems, coming out on the other side. We've made it through, but we will never be the same.



As I look around this boat, I am filled with gratitude. At the risk of leaving someone out, I'd like to lift up some appreciations:

- She created opportunities for people of all ages to continue formational practices that led to deeper faith, a stronger sense of justice, and meaningful connections with each other. She has served as Associate Minister longer under Covid than before it: Rev. Lacey Hunter.
- ♦ She made phone calls and visits, offered time and space for prayer and contemplation, held the ill and the grieving: Rev. Rachel Knuth
- ♦ She began her role after the pandemic began, adapting to the changing situation, keeping our community in communication, and overseeing the management of our facility: Chris Chang Weeks.
- ♦ She made a Handbell Ensemble into a close-knit community, ministering to passersby in Ragle Park who shed tears to hear the sound of bells. She coordinated with composers and musicians to craft digital works of musical art: Karna Roa. A wonderful director alone does not an ensemble make. Let's hear it for all the members of our Handbell Ensemble.
- ♦ She stepped in to keep our hymn-singing alive, recording separate singers and blending them into a single chorus. She riffed and ragged so we could tap our toes while worshiping from home: J. Althea. And let's hear it for our singers, especially those who showed up week after week to sing from the heart and sustain our worship: Gene, Judy, Jenna, Dawson, Lois, Roger, Yvette, Bobbie, Andy, and Sharon.

Faith Formation: Generation on Fire

On May 28, three brave young women began trekking from Paradise, California to San Francisco; a 266 mile event. Their goal was to begin a push for the Civilian Climate Corps, an aspect of the Green New Deal (GND). The Green New Deal is the most ambitious piece of legislation since the New Deal passed with FDR as President. New York Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and Massachusetts Sen. Ed Markey introduced the bill into congress. The Green New Deal will help extremely lessen the climate crisis and create millions of good jobs in the pro-

cess. The Civilian Climate Corps is one of the main segments of the GND. Markey describes it as, "A diverse and equitable group of 1.5 million Americans [that] over five years will complete federally-funded projects that help communities respond to climate change and transition to a clean economy. Civilian Climate Corps work will reduce carbon emissions, enable a transition to renewable energy, build healthier and more resilient communities, implement conservation projects with proven climate benefits, and help communities recover from climate disasters." On June 14, almost 100 people had joined with those original activists as part of the Sunrise Movement's climate justice initiative called Generation on Fire.



A few dozen others and I met the group as they approached the Golden Gate Bridge for a "day of action" in San Francisco targeting Senator Dianne Feinstein and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi. As we continued walking through the heat, we began chanting, singing, and protesting. The first part of the day, we marched to Senator Feinstein's house, a massive mansion far away from the bustling streets of the city. We held a rally on her doorstep, using spray chalk to stencil words and images in front of the house. After protesting at Senator Feinstein's, we made our way to the




House Speaker Nancy Pelosi's house. At our second rally of the day, members of the group painted a 16-foot mural in the street in front of Speaker Pelosi's house. It read "Civilian Climate Corps" and "Invest in Us." Rep. Pelosi's press secretary responded to our demonstration by saying, "the courage and resilience of the young climate ac


The Mandala Making Workshop was a lovely retreat-style morning in the Fountain Courtyard. Seven people gathered for

contemplation, experienced the movement of the spirit, and created mandalas ("mandala" is the sanskrit word for "circle"). The symmetry of a mandala is calming, the concentric circles can


re-center us after a time of disorientation (like emerging out of a



pandemic!). Creating a mandala is both artistic and meditative-- something beautiful is created, but it's the process that is most important. Mandalas are a prayer language, inviting us to be in the moment with God, suspending thought, allowing us to connect with God.



ter-- what is centering you now? Then from that center, you start creating shapes outward. If you're making a mandala at home, remember not to plan too much, but to be free, repeating shapes that feel right to you. You can use an eraser! If you like prompts, you might consider the four sides of your paper as the prayer-space to ask God for guidance on four questions: How do I accept change? How do I cope with suffering? How



LEADERSHIP COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - June 16, 2021

Summary of what was accomplished during the Leadership Council Meeting:

- * Pastor Ben's Sabbatical proposal was approved. Pastor Rachel will work full-time during those months.
- * Approval to upgrade wifi on campus and to install iWave air purification systems in the HVAC systems in the sanctuary, offices, Fellowship Hall, Pilgrim Center and Media Center. Memorial Hall will require stand-alone air purifier units.
- * Financial report: April ended with a positive net result of \$19.5K.

Quick Updates:

- The Recycle Kiosk may be installed at the end of June
- We may need to start paying the hourly employees every two weeks instead of monthly
- No updates from the City of Sebastopol on the status of the permit for the Conestoga huts

I want you woven into a tapestry of love, in touch with everything there is to know of God. Then you will have minds confident and at rest, focused on Christ, God's great mystery.







As I thought about finally coming back together after over a year of being apart, I searched for banner ideas that would be express what it would mean to be back together and celebrate being woven back together. The church had a storage bin full of ribbon and I wondered if something could be created with that colorful ribbon. I found on Pinterest a similar design of what is shown here. With the help of Bobbie Johanson, Judy Peterson, Joyce Cox, Jane Huneke and Nancy Shimetz (not pictured) we were able to accomplish our vision. These banners will be up throughout summer and hopefully we will be back in the sanctuary soon for all to enjoy.

Checking Off the List

We face two challenges before we can hold meetings and worship indoors: how to make the indoor space as safe as possible from viruses and how to livestream worship services and other events on campus.

Corona virus is spread through airborne particles or aerosols in the air when we open our mouths. A challenge has been to improve the air circulation and air purification in the buildings, including the sanctuary, offices, Fellowship Hall, Pilgrim Center and Memorial Hall. The solution may be simple and elegant, and part of it has been resolved already for the sanctuary.

Thanks to efforts from Tom Terry, Robertson's Mechanical sent a technician to review the HVAC system in the sanctuary. He discovered that the fan had never been connected to the thermostat. This meant that although there is a fan attached to the HVAC system, it was not possible to turn on the fans during stuffy, sweltering days during the summer. The fans draw 90% of the air from underground; the other 10% is from ambient air, resulting in release of cool air into the sanctuary. By switching to battery and attaching the wire that previously had been connected from the electrical power to the fan switch in the thermostat, the fans now work, and thus the air circulation in the sanctuary has greatly improved.

To address air purification, we will be attaching iWave air purification units that uses needle point bi-polar ionization technology to the HVAC systems. These devices will be attached to all the HVAC systems on campus. When air passes over the iWave, ions produced by the device reduce pathogens, allergens, particles, smoke and odors in the air, creating a healthy environment without any harmful byproducts, such as ozone. Memorial Hall, with its heaters installed on the ceilings, will need stand-along air purifiers instead of an iWave system.

The second challenge has been to improve the wifi access on campus which has been very inadequate. An upgrade is part of what is needed to support live-streaming of our worship services and other events, thus giving people an option to either worship in person or on-line. John Henel is working with a wifi consultant from one of the 12-Step groups who has mapped out a solution that includes mesh wifi and changing our internet service provider from AT&T to Comcast/Xfinity.

We expect both the air purification systems and wifi projects to be finished by August-September. These are both significant facility improvements that will benefit all users of our spaces, and be an important feature for facility rentals.

- ♦ They met on Zoom every month, carrying out the business of the church, making decisions that helped carry us through, stewarding finances, aligning vision, deepening understanding of what it will require of us to be an anti-racist church, spending many hours in-between meetings connecting with the congregation, supporting the staff, and encouraging the membership: our Leadership Council.
- They came every week, sometimes twice a week, to weed, mow, prune, clip, rake, sweep, water, spray, and scrub. If you haven't been on our campus in 15 months, the only reason it looks cared for is because it was cared for by our Grounds team, including Larry, Roger, Judy, Jane, Buck, Marna, Barbara, Lois, and Tom.
- ♦ They gathered nearly every week, sometimes on Zoom and sometimes in-person. They were teens and pre-teens, young adults and elders. Battling Zoom fatigue, they encouraged and prayed for each other, wondered about the deeper meanings and wider implications of the times we're in, and just plain got goofy: our Middle and High Schoolers and their adult leaders.
- ♦ They got up on Sunday mornings instead of sleeping in. They made Zoom run smoothly. They shared their tech-spertise and made worship possible: our Teen Tech Team Jonah, Aaron, Drew, and Marin.
- She made Godly Play videos for most Sundays of the past year so that our children would know they were seen and valued and included: Terri Harper.
- ♦ He provided the leadership and oversight necessary to continue offering hospitality to our Safe Parking guests: Gary Bachelor.
- ♦ He turned farming into a ministry, creating friendships among gardeners and providing fresh produce and friendly faces to those unable to leave their homes: Garth Watson.
- ♦ She came like a thief in the night with bolts of fabric and spools of thread. She decorated a sanctuary that few would see with their own eyes, an offering to the Lord: Kathy Matthies.
- ♦ They each came twice a week to check on the facility, making sure the doors were secure and reporting any issues: Linda Roa and Kathy Bell.
- ♦ You gave faithfully and generously, writing and sending checks, setting up recurring payments through your bank, figuring out how to give online. You shared stimulus funds and would often include little notes in your envelopes: all financial donors.
- ♦ You came to worship even though it wasn't the same. You opened yourself up to a new way of being together. To those who participated in Zoom worship, even just by showing up, I can say that I would not have made it through this year without you, and I thank you.

As I look around this boat, I am filled with gratitude.
