Purpose and Connection

Only ¼ of my children have school off during Holy Week this year. I know school calendars are secular and that's ok, it's a reflection of the broader culture, and besides it's not like sports have crept onto Easter Sunday (yet!). But part of me still feels stubborn about it. If I'm being super honest, I want our whole world to take a big week-long in-breath, so we can collectively let it out together: Alleluia! New Life is possible for all! (Not that the whole world needs to convert to Christianity, but a global acknowledgment of brokenness followed by a worldwide vision of hope, sounds pretty good right now).

The stories of Holy Week are some of the most important in our Christian faith: foot washing, the Last Supper, the arrest and trial of Jesus, crucifixion and burial. These stories speak to the places of crucifixion around us right now— I think of war, poverty and housing issues, addiction, and illness... We need these stories of humility and suffering, facing death and brokenness, forgiveness and grace. I want to linger here... Do you?

I saw a recent article on why Christians avoid Holy Week— why many of us want to skip over the hard stuff. It's why some churches tell the Passion story on Palm Sunday, or tack Tenebrae at the end of Maundy Thursday. Pastors have had to sneak a bit of Holy Week into Sunday worship because they've observed their flock doesn't attend mid-week services. And it's both a scheduling issue— the world no longer slows down for Holy Week like it used to— and a human condition issue— the stories of Holy Week challenge us.

But what better way to be challenged and grow than in the context of community? What better way to fully celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ than to share in the bodily rituals of foot washing and Communion, and telling the story of Good Friday? Besides, how can we proclaim new life and resurrection hope without admitting there are places of crucifixion all around us?

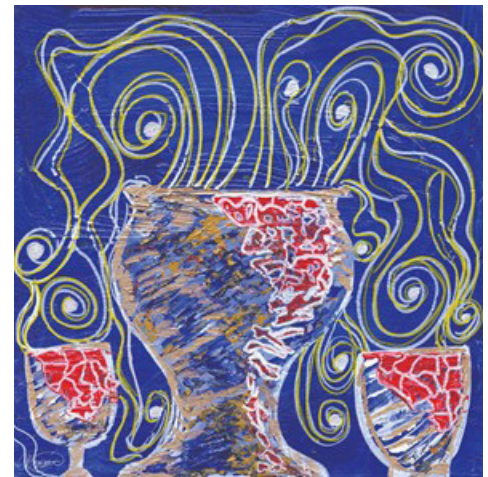
April 10 – Palm Sunday

We begin worship with a palm processional, the Chancel Choir offers sacred music, and Rev. Rachel Knuth preaches a sermon on Luke 19:28-40.

April 14 – Maundy Thursday / Foot Washing / Communion

6:30pm – Sanctuary

At this special evening service led by Rev. Rachel Knuth, we remember the “mandatum” or “command” to love one another, and experience this love through the acts of foot washing and sharing Communion. Our Communion chalice will be filled with “posca,” the wine of the poor in ancient Rome. The Chancel Choir offers sacred music, led by Andy DelMonte.

April 15 – Good Friday

DIY Nature Stations of the Cross – Go out in nature on your own or with a companion, and follow the self-guided “Way of the Cross,” looking for stations of the cross as they’re written into creation. Great for your back yard or on a hike. Pick up your guide in the church office anytime during Holy Week, appropriate for all ages.

April 17 – Easter Sunday 9:00am + 11:00am

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Handbell Ensemble and Chancel Choir offer music, children join their families in worship, and Rev. Rachel Knuth shares a sermon on Luke 24:1-12. Christ is Risen Indeed, Hallelujah!

April 24 – Second Sunday of Eastertide

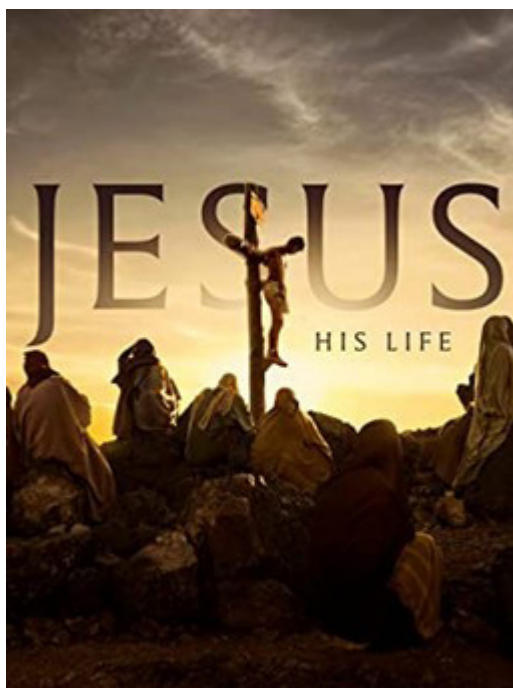

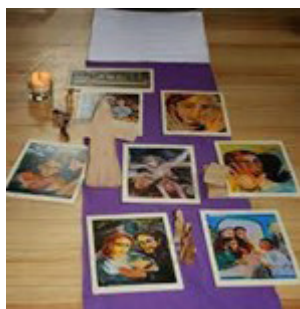
During Holy Week the church will be showing the last two installments of this acclaimed drama series.

There are some reasons I think someone should not observe Holy Week, but they are few. It's pretty rare, but sometimes a person's brokenness is so fresh that the rituals of Holy Week hurt too much, and are best saved for next year. Of course, the rituals done in community might be an opportunity for nourishment that would speak directly to a person experiencing grief. But I could see how an anguished person might need a different kind of Holy Week this year. Another reason someone might avoid Holy Week is because they believe that eschewing "negativity" will lead to them being able to "manifest positivity." This is a bit problematic (God is the one who manifests new life, and avoiding negative thoughts doesn't make painful things go away), but I could imagine how that kind of thinking would keep someone from participating.

But there are some really great reasons we can and should participate in Holy Week, as fully as we are able. Here are a few:

- ✿ Because having our feet washed is a way toward humility and grace in community
- ✿ We see crucifixion written into the world and need a place to acknowledge that
- ✿ Good Friday speaks to the power of witnessing suffering as a way to change our world
- ✿ We need our spiritual life to come close to our experience of suffering and death
- ✿ Our usual schedule is packed, and it's a counter-cultural act of faith to prioritize spirituality before tasks
- ✿ Holy Week deepens our Easter experience

So if you're starting to catch the Holy Week spirit, we do have some beautiful services and experiences planned for people of all ages, including "Holy Week in a Box" kits for families to take home, a video series, foot washing, Communion, a nature hike, and soup with hot cross buns. You can mix-and-match what works best for your capacity and spiritual needs. Reading scripture each day in the quiet of your home might be what you need this year. Or following our "Full to the Brim" devotional each day. Or coming to the Maundy Thursday service.

However you participate, I just encourage you to choose Holy Week. Think about where you are in your spiritual life this season, and make a decision that will support your growth, and the flourishing of our community. Of course I'd love to see you at our mid-week gatherings. But what I want even more is for you to be engaged, fully engaged, in the spiritual gifts of Holy Week. However you decide to participate, I pray God's blessing upon your Holy Week spiritual journey.

And then... Easter morning will dawn, and together we will proclaim, "Christ is Risen, Alleluia Indeed!" ✿

Introducing... Our Leadership Council!

What is the Leadership Council?

I'm so glad you asked! Our Leadership Council is the group of 8 leaders who take a "balcony view" of our whole church, while pretty much the rest of the congregation is on the "dance floor." Their primary purpose is to think—whether doing long-term visioning, being reflective after an event, or strategizing for the future— they are thinking about our church's health and well-being. Their Ministry Job Description states that their purpose is to "enable the congregation to fulfill its mission by providing effective leadership, financial oversight, and strategic vision."

The LC is made up of one Moderator, four Council Members for Ministry Areas, and three Council Officers for Resource Areas, and together they provide support and accountability to all of the Teams and Committees in the church. They're elected by the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January. Also they are awesome.

There are four people who also attend LC meetings, ex-officio (which means they don't vote): Barbara Deedler (Clerk), Chris Chang Weeks (Congregational Administrator), and the Pastors.

Some of our Leadership Council Members also volunteer in other ways around the church, so they wear several hats. When they're operating as a Leadership Council Member, they're on the balcony. When they're volunteering to make ministry happen, they're on the dance floor. You'll know they're on the balcony when they wear their special LC name tags, which look like this:



One important thing for you, as a member of the church, to know is this:

You can talk to any of the LC members about your ideas and thoughts!

Who is serving on our church Leadership Council?

Bob Curtis: LC Moderator



In Bob's words... "As the church's Moderator, I am primarily responsible for the facilitation, review, and guidance of our church's Leadership Council. I also serve as support for the Lead Minister and, together with the Lead Minister, design the Leadership Council meetings and other gatherings such as the church's Annual Meeting."

A Fun Fact about Bob: He met his wife swing dancing, and though he describes himself as "the worst dancer," she said yes to dancing with him, reportedly because he didn't have sweaty hands.

Tom Terry: Council Officer for Facilities (Vice-Moderator)



In Tom's words...

"The Facilities Committee

1. Is tasked with "managing the church's physical assets," i.e., the buildings, grounds, furniture, appliances, etc.
2. Performs in-house maintenance, repairs and replacement of said assets and often plans & manages new installations performed by outside vendors, e.g., air filtration

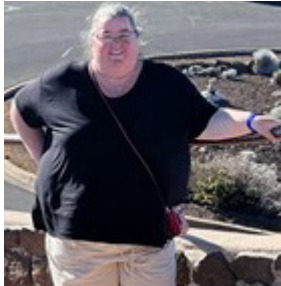

In Deidra’s words... “I am new to the role of treasurer, so am still learning, but I see my role as supporting and facilitating the rest of the church ministry.”

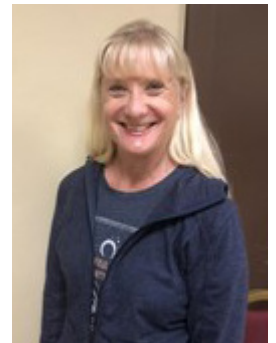
A Fun Fact about Deidra: When she went to Hawai’i in 1st Grade, her teacher asked to be in her suitcase, and she was not quite sure what that meant??

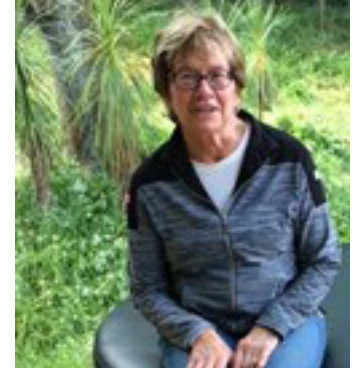

Open for Business A New Recycling & Redemption Center at the Danmar Parking Lot



A new Beverage Container Recycling Pilot Program has come to Sebastopol, located at the church's Danmar parking lot. The recycling and redemption center is open on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Customers can bring their plastic, glass and aluminum beverage containers separated by material type, to be weighed onsite, with a maximum of 25 pounds of each material accepted per customer per day. Customers can receive payment either by check or Venmo.

This program is made possible through a partnership with the City of Sebastopol, Community Church of Sebastopol, Zero Waste Sonoma and Petaluma Recycling Center, a program of United Cerebral Palsy of the North Bay. ❁
