"Ordinary" Growth with Purpose and Connection

I look out at my garden this time of year, and it isn't the big fall harvest, with tomatoes bumping and squash rambling and lemon cucumbers I can't keep up with.

But there are things happening out there. I found a loveliness of ladybugs tucked into tobacco leaves (we accidentally grew tobacco instead of comfrey last year, but that's ok)-- and there are vegetables, including sweet little radishes. Their green tops are quietly collecting sunshine, cheering on the rosy fruit beneath the soil.



The Season of Epiphany is considered "Ordinary

Time" in the church, and mirrors this quiet collection of warmth that supports underground growth. By that I mean, it's a season when we are invited to experience God



in the ordinary stuff of life, which warms us on the inside and connects us to God. I'm a person on the go, so one practice that helps me feel connected to God is Notice + Savor + Respond. That usually looks like Noticing something beautiful (like the ladybugs in our tobacco leaves), Savoring it (enjoying the bright red color contrasted by the green waxy leaves), and Responding (saying a prayer: "Thank you, God"). Epiphany lends itself to noticing God

in the ordinary. You might try this practice of Notice+Savor+Respond on your next morning walk, or sitting outside with a cup of tea. See what happens, I'd love to hear about it.

In many ways this will be an "ordinary" February in the "Ordinary Time" of Epiphany. I know what you're probably thinking, because at first I was thinking it too— How could this possibly be an ordinary month? Pastor Benjamin is engaging a sabbatical, Pastor Lacey has transitioned to ministry with a new congregation, and our clergy staff is looking pretty different than how it's looked in the past couple of years. We'll also have two guest preachers filling our pulpit this month. But! Then I had the thought— What could be more ordinary than change? Congregations experience change all the time, with the arrivals and departures of clergy and staff, parishioners who join or move away, music that is new to worship, leaders who rotate on and off boards, not to mention the change of internal growth from lived spirituality. Change is a part of life.

Personally, the two words I'm carrying forward through the month of February are "Purpose" and "Connection." As Acting Lead Minister, I think that a way to frame our time together is to focus on our Purpose: How can we continue to live into our church's mission statement? — and our Connection: How can we continue to be connected to one another and to God? My plan is to work with our Leadership Council and Staff, to offer connected leadership that is rooted in our collective purpose as a congregation, with a focus to deepen our relationships in community. I know I won't be able to personally fill all the shoes of our previous Pastoral staffing structure. And I will make mistakes. But I plan to "keep calm and carry on." Thankfully being a Minister is quite relational work, which means we can "keep calm and carry on" together! We have a strong community of committed people, a loveliness of care for one another, and excellent lay leadership. We can also lean on our scriptures this month, which remind us to sink deeper into relationship with God, to stand on a level place, to love our neighbors with mercy, and to experience awe.

LIVE-STREAMED GRATITUDE

 \mathbf{I}^n their book on leadership, Ronald Heifetz and Donald Laurie make a distinction between "technical" and "adaptive" challenges. With technical challenges, "the necessary know-how and procedures are already

available." For example, a technical challenge in our church, like "We need to let the congregation know whether worship this week will be in-person, on Zoom, live-streamed, or some combination?" can be addressed with, "The Congregational Administrator will notify the congregation in the weekly all-church email."

Adaptive challenges require experiments, new discoveries, and novel adjustments.

What about adaptive challenges? Adaptive challenges, accord-

ing to Heifetz and Laurie, "require experiments, new discoveries, and novel adjustments." A huge adaptive challenge we faced in the past 6 months was, "How do we create the ability to offer live-streamed video of worship services and other events from our sanctuary once we are able to return to indoor and in-person gatherings?" At the outset, we did not know who could lead the process of addressing this challenge; we did know how we could fund it; we did not know who could take on smaller pieces of the project; and we did not know who could run the system once it was installed. Nevertheless, the Spirit helped us by providing people with energy and gifts to address this challenge.

It began with a generous financial gift from Garth & Norma Watson. Garth had served for a time on our Safe Return Task Force, and he could see that once we started to return to in-person worship we would need to have a way to continue including people who preferred to worship from home and out of town/state/country. These funds created possibilities. Thank you, Norma and Garth!

Those of you who participated in Zoom worship anytime between September 2020 and June 2021 know that one blessing of the pandemic situation was that we, as a congregation, got to enjoy professional recordings of our Handbell Ensemble enabled by our Handbell Director and church member, Karna Roa. Separate from her music responsibilities, Karna agreed to manage the overall live-stream project. She had a friend who had set up live-streaming capabilities for his own church in Reno and been sharing his expertise with other churches. Karna put in many hours figuring out what equipment we would need to buy that would interface with our current sound system and what human supports would need to be in place to make the system run consistently. Thank you, Karna!

John Henel, in addition to serving as our church Treasurer in recent years, is also our webmaster and technical go-to person. John helped set up a new mesh Wi-Fi system throughout the campus, including the sanctuary. We would need this strong signal in order to livestream from the sanctuary. Thank you, John!

Kim Buckman was tapped to build a shelf that would hold the two cameras that we currently use, one with a fixed, wide-angle lens, and another with a rotating telescopic lens. It was a relatively small project, but one without which the live-stream project would have stalled. Thank you, Buck!

Based on the recommendation of Karna and her friend, we purchased a new laptop with high-definition media card, the two cameras mentioned above, and various other cords and adapters to make this new hardware compatible with our sanctuary sound system. But who would be able to competently run the system on a consistent basis? Teenagers.

ALL-AGES LENTEN WORKSHOP / NATURE WALK

February 27 at 3:00pm Grove of Old Trees 17599 Fitzpatrick Ln, Occidental







Our Lenten Workshop this year will be a Nature Walk at the Grove of Old Trees, a forest preserved by LandPaths off Joy Road in Occidental. All people are welcome! We will meet up at the parking lot for a prayer and brief instructions, then meander through the forest of old-growth redwoods, each at our own pace. As we walk, we will each be on the lookout for three things to take home for our Lenten journey: 1 symbol of life, 1 symbol of death, 1 symbol of resurrection. These found nature objects will become for us symbols we pray with during Lent. The trails at the Grove of Old Trees are fairly flat (not hilly) and covered in soft redwood and pine needles. There's a small parking area in front of the Grove, carpooling is recommended.

For an at-home alternative, you can begin with prayer, asking God to be with you as you move around your home in search of three objects: 1 symbol of life, 1 symbol of death, 1 symbol of resurrection. You might cut out a photo of trees from this newsletter (life), find some dried flowers (death), and draw a picture of a butterfly (resurrection). Look around with intention and see what speaks to you.

Once settled at home with your three objects, place them on your dining table, to pray with at meal time throughout Lent. Your prayers during Lent might look something like this:

(Holding your symbol of life): God, today I noticed you when...

(Holding your symbol of death): God, today I confess that I turned away from you when...

(Holding your symbol of resurrection): God, today I thank you for showing me new life when...

Amen.

Karna met with our Tech Team to train them on how the system worked and what would need to be done on a week-to-week basis to create a quality live-stream. Initially, Aaron Knuth and Marin Broadbent-Bell got up to speed so that we could begin live-streamed worship from the sanctuary on November 28, 2021, the First Sunday in Advent. Within a few weeks, Jonah Gonzales and Owen Thomas were also trained. If you've watched the live-stream, you know that there are different camera angles. These are set before the worship service by the Tech Team based on what will be happening in the service. You may also have noticed titles that come up at the beginning of each piece of the liturgy. These are also created ahead of time by the Tech Team. Each Sunday, they respond to technical challenges and work to improve the live-stream experience for all. Thank you, Aaron, Marin, Jonah, and Owen!

Enabling live-streamed worship is one adaptive challenge we have faced as a church and responded to with success. We are so grateful to Garth, Norma, Karna, John, Buck, Aaron, Marin, Jonah, and Owen for the parts they have played in expanding our ministry in this way. I hope you'll express a word of thanks to each of them as the opportunities arise.

Also, let this example be a parable for the kinds of things we can accomplish as a congregation especially when we don't know right away how we will respond to new challenges. Adaptive challenges will require experimentation, risk, some failure, and people willing to do their smaller part in service of the larger good. We do this with confidence because, as always, "the Spirit helps us."


The month of February is Black History Month in the United States and Faith Formation Teams would like to present a couple of events to honor Black History.

Event #2:"The Black Church: This Is Our Story, This is Our Song" Media Viewing Series

Join a limited capacity of viewers (*due to COVID) to watch this critically acclaimed documentary series on the history of the Black Church in the United States. This two-part series (each part is 1 hr 45 min) from executive producer, host and writer Henry Louis Gates, Jr., the Alphonse Fletcher University Professor at Harvard University and director of the Hutchins Center for African and African American Research, that traces the 400-year-old story of the Black church in America, all the way down to its bedrock role as the site of African American survival and grace, organizing and resilience, thriving and testifying, autonomy and freedom, solidarity and speaking truth to power. The documentary reveals how Black people have worshipped and, through their spiritual journeys, improvised ways to bring their faith traditions from Africa to



the New World, while translating them into a form of Christianity that was not only truly their own, but a redemptive force for a nation whose original sin was found in their ancestors' enslavement across the Middle Passage. Link to view the trailer: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Wu7_HisWgBU
