


A Presence Closer than Your Breath

One the requirements of candidates for ministry in the United Church of Christ is to write an "Ordination Paper." In that many-paged paper, the candidate describes their personal understanding of God's call upon their life followed by their theological understanding of major Christian themes and their institutional understanding of the history and polity of the U.C.C. When I was endeavoring to accomplish this assignment, I remember getting hung up on the Christian idea of "providence."

I don't remember "providence" being covered in any course I took in seminary, so I had to research it myself. Since that time, I've come to understand providence as the important observation that God, in God's mercy, provides creation and all its creatures with everything they need to live and even thrive. As Marilynne Robinson said in a recent interview, "It's as if God created the world for the purpose of human delight."



- When the disciples thought they'd steer Jesus' ministry toward insurrection, he countered by offering himself as a sacrifice to show them what love looked like.
- When they despaired at his death and wanted to retaliate, Jesus rose from the tomb as a sign of victory over violence.
- When they wanted to hold onto him, he ascended from a singular location so that he could be anywhere for anyone.
- When they sat around doing nothing and wondering what to do next, he provided the Spirit, which he also called an "Advocate."

Community Church, does God continue to provide all we need to carry out the ministry to which we are called? By faith, we must answer yes. God provides us with people to collaborate on the all the work that matters. God provides land to gather on and buildings to house our programs. God provides financial resources and the generosity needed to let those resources flow into and through our community. Whenever we're tempted to imagine ourselves as isolated and self-sufficient, the Holy Spirit provides us just enough discomfort to wake us up.






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OUTREACH COMMITTEE HOSTS GUEST SPEAKER FROM VERITY

On Sunday, May 5th after worship, the Outreach Committee welcomes Rebecca Fein, Executive Director of Verity, to in-

intervention and counseling. They have a 24/7 hotline available, and they provide crisis intervention to anyone affected

by sexual assault, including survivors, their family and friends, and those who have been sex trafficked. Verity also provides trauma care and counseling services for adults and children over the age of 6. And, Verity offers community education (in both English and Spanish), going into classrooms and community centers to teach prevention strategies in the wider community.

For the past five years, the Outreach Committee has directed some of our congregation's Wider Mission funds to support Verity and their important work in Sonoma County. We've also led gift card drives at Christmas. People who have escaped sex trafficking often have nothing, and gift cards can really help. We believe the work of Verity is worth championing because their services truly impact the lives of women in Sonoma County.

Here are a few words about **Rebecca Fein**, from her bio:

Becky Fein is a long-time advocate for survivors of sexual assault and violence, and has demonstrated her unwavering dedication to supporting survivors throughout her career. She brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to Verity, having spent several years at Active Minds, where she made significant contributions to the field of mental health and advocacy. She holds a bachelor's degree in Sociology from UC Davis, and a Master's in Public Health, with an emphasis in sexual assault prevention and survivor empowerment from Columbia University. Mom of two, Becky spends her evenings and weekends chasing toddlers and working on DIY home improvement projects!

CELEBRATE! CELEBRATE!

A historical event in the life of our church happens Saturday, May 4t, at the City of Refuge UCC, near the Oakland Coliseum: the Installation of our new Conference Minister, **Rev. Davena Jones**. This is likely to be a vibrant, musical and joy-filled event!

Who is Davena? This lifelong member of one of the historic African-American churches in the UCC, Rev. Jones is a San Francisco native and blessed with a lively and generous style. She served as a NCNC Associate Conference Minister for eight years, focusing on Youth and Young Adult Ministry and Anti-Racism Ministry. At the Northern California Nevada Conference last spring, I was impressed by her unvarnished assessment of the status of churches which was balanced by her enthusiasm and her belief in a positive future, as she lead a call and response of "I am the Conference," with the entire room joining in.

Then you ask, "What is a Conference?" Our church is part of the Bay Association, which is part of the geographically larger Northern California Nevada (regional) Conference, which belongs to our National office, housed in Cleveland, Ohio. I think of the Association, Conference and National entities as supporting local churches with curriculum, tools for outreach, legacy planning, disaster relief efforts, church camping and mission programs.

Then: "UCC" = United Church of Christ. What interests me is how the UCC differs from other denominations in how we govern ourselves. Part is our history: five different "streams" contributed to the founding of the UCC 67 years ago: Congregational, Evangelical, German Reformed, Christian and Black Churches. In these days of entities splintering apart, it is refreshing that our story is one of merger.

The leaders formed a model that let each church decide the style of governance they wanted. When our denomination meets bi-annually at General Synod, each church gets a voice and a vote on an initiative, but it is the local church that decides if and how it might act on the initiative. I think this flexibility helps us tackle social issues quickly.

Our church began in 1889 as "First Congregational Church of Sebastopol," honoring the historical congregational model of having the lay people decide matters like selecting ministers, dealing with finances, including purchase and development of buildings. So, we differ from Presbyterian churches in that the Presbytery (the regional gathering) makes a decision and all parishes must follow. We differ from the Methodists and Roman Catholics where clergy are placed in a local church.

Why does this matter to me? Early in my teen years, my church was family for my widowed mother, sister and me. Also my church stood up to our East Bay neighborhood as we committed to build HUD housing on our church's property. My neighbors feared integration. Swastikas were scratched on our church doors. Threats to our Pastor and his family were phoned to their home. I took a date to the city council meeting that approved the housing. That housing is still integrated, as is the street I grew up on. I'm grateful for these early life experiences that helped me understand the importance of anti-racism work. And now, I celebrate this Installation of a clergywoman who lets her light, her fire and grit show. It is part of what our denomination stands for. I think the UCC is about merging, not splintering; and welcoming instead of judging.

SEBASTOPOL INTER-CHURCH FOOD PANTRY May is "Canned Soup with a Pull-Tab" Month at Community Church

Hey have you noticed there's a grocery cart in the hallway by the church office? Our church gladly accepts donations for the Sebastopol Inter-Church Food Pantry, which is an Outreach ministry of our church, in partnership with other local churches. You can place your donations right into the cart, and they'll be taken over to St. Stephen's Episcopal, where the pantry is housed. (Thank you to the volunteers from our church who do this!!)

Our church collected food for the pantry as a spiritual practice during Lent. The idea was to connect our weekly Communion sacrament with Jesus'

proclamation to "go and do likewise." As we have received nourishment at our Communion Table, we go out into the community to share nourishment with others. Volunteers at the pantry noticed that our church delivered high-quality items that helped stock the shelves with desirable items.

And we are still going strong with our collections! In April we declared "peanut butter and jelly" month, and our congregation responded with awesome and copious amounts of pb&j!

For May, the Inter-Church Food Pantry would love to receive canned soup with a pull-tab. Volunteers have found that not all people who come to the pantry have access to a can opener, so that's why the pull-tabs are so important. And, they'd love to stock the shelves with some more soup.

When I go shopping, I like to pop an extra something in the cart for the pantry. I choose high quality items that I myself would buy for my family— which usually means organic and avoiding plastic containers. If you're aiming to donate from items you already have at home, that's fine too— just please, no expired foods.

Of course, if you have delicious canned items you want to donate that are not related to the theme of the month (or you happen to get soup that doesn't have a pull-tab) we will still take it! Gladly! Just pop it on in to the grocery cart by the church office.

MEETINGS THAT DESERVE A ROUND OF A-PAWS

Have you ever been to a boring meeting? Oh gosh I sure have. A number of years ago I was in a meeting where about 45 minutes was spent determining whose job it was to replace the soap in the soap dispenser. I couldn't believe I had left my young children at home and paid a babysitter to be there.

But I've also been part of meetings that have felt deeply meaningful and connecting, ready to broaden my thinking. Whenever that happens, I notice that the vibe at the meeting is engaged and exciting, even if (maybe especially if) there's healthy and respectful

disagreement about an idea. People's creativity seems opened up and there's a sense of "flow." I always go home from those meetings daydreaming and inspired. I can tell the Holy Spirit is moving and energizing the people in the room, myself included. I think people in general want to have meaningful experiences and to feel like they have something to contribute towards a greater goal.

So what makes a good church meeting? If you're a frequent leader of meetings, I'd love to hear what works best for you. And if you're a frequent attender of meetings, I'd love to hear what you notice about how a good vibe is fostered, and what makes you leave the meeting satisfied and inspired.

Here are a few tried and true techniques I really like:

When the facilitator clearly states the purpose of the meeting. It sounds simple, but when the facilitator opens the meeting with the purpose, it can totally get people focused.

When there's a prayer before we get to work. One of the cool things our Leadership Council does is pray together at the beginning and ending of each meeting. The prayer time connects us to each other and to God. I love being able to take a deep breath, get centered, and thank God for the work ahead, it reminds me we are being the Body of Christ. What a gift to be a spiritual community that also gets rad things done.

When the facilitator has an agenda, with time allotted for each topic — and the more specific each topic is, the better. For example, an agenda with no time designation, and the general topic "Apocalyptic Literature" might lead to a long meandering discussion about how Harry Potter is apocalyptic (or not) and nothing will get decided, but maybe someone will mention Revelation or the "little apocalypse" in Mark, and someone else might say — how can any apocalypse be "little?" Whereas, an agenda that spells out, from 2:00-2:20 p.m. the topic is "What 3 things do we want participants in the *Apocalyptic Literature in the Bible* class to know, by the time the class ends?", will have a more focused conversation.

When the facilitator promotes creativity by either sending the discussion topics ahead of time, or giving space for creative thinking to happen during the meeting. I was at a school meeting once where parents were to brainstorm in small groups — we were given sharpies and poster paper and we got to jam on ideas together, make a poster, and then present it to the wider group. We had a whole half-hour to work together, luxurious. But even before the brainstorming sesh, the facilitator had us

connect with each other on a personal level. He asked us to go around and name something we personally cared about, that was related to the topic, but just about ourselves. I left feeling like I had gotten to know my group-mates, and contributed ideas toward a greater goal.

When the facilitator ends on time.

Rev. Bruce Reyes-Chow says one of the best things leaders at all levels of church leadership can do, is agree that spiritual leadership is the primary purpose – he says, "Sure, the church has to run and people have to do things, but at the highest level of church leadership, a smoothly running church should not be the goal, rather a faithfully living one should be." Being a faithful living church that both tends and strives to be the Body of Christ – that sounds like a value I can get behind.
