The End Is Coming?

"The former things have passed away... Behold, I am making all things new."

Revelation 21:4–5

In the Christian imagination, November marks the end. No, not the end of the world, but the end of the year. The liturgical calendar, a spiritual tool that marks time in a cyclical way, begins each Advent and concludes on Reign of Christ Sunday, this year on November 24. As we draw closer to the end, scriptures prescribed by the common lectionary grow increasingly apocalyptic. They draw from the portions of the Bible that use images, symbols, coded language, poetry, and outlandish visions to describe a future world beyond the grasp of any ruler who is currently in charge. This literature is alarming and difficult to decipher. But while it is potentially disturbing, it is rooted in the hope that another future is possible.

I write this article two weeks before the 2024 election. I share the fear of many who wonder whether the end is coming, that is, the end of democracy as we know it, the end of civil rights, the end of a shared sense of the common good. Anticipating this election feels apocalyptic, like everything is at stake and no matter how things turn out, nothing will ever be the same again. Whew. That's a lot to bear.

The Greek word *Apocalypse* means something close to "unveiling." An apocalypse need not be scary or unwanted. Nor is it neces-



sarily the end. Unexpected, perhaps, but an apocalypse reveals God's intentions for the world, and if the God you believe in is the God who is Love, then look for God's loving intentions to be revealed in places where it had previously been hidden.

Consider this year's Confirmation Class, seven 8th and 9th graders on a 10-week journey exploring faith: Henry and his dry, disarming humor. Avy in her cowgirl boots and self-deprecating charm. Ainsley's calm compassion and intelligent openness. Benji's brilliant, genuinely searching questions. Emilia's wise quietude belying an adventurous spirit. Eleonora's bracing maturity and matter-of-fact contentment. Josie's eager attentiveness and palpable courage. Who knew – besides their parents – that all that teen awesomeness has been hiding among us in plain sight?

Confirmation Sunday happens almost two weeks after the election. We don't know what will happen on November 5, but on November 17, our

Daylight saving time in the United States

NTERESTING FACTS

As of March 2023, the following states and territories did not observe DST: Arizona (except for the <u>Navajo</u>, who do observe daylight saving time in the <u>Navajo Nation</u>), Hawaii, American Samoa, Guam, The Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.



- The <u>Uniform Time Act of 1966</u> established a uniform set of rules for states opting to observe daylight saving time.
- In the U.S., daylight saving time starts on the second Sunday in March and ends on the first Sunday in November, with the time changes taking place at 2:00 a.m., local time. With a mnemonic word play referring to seasons, clocks "spring forward, and fall back."
- In 2022, the United States Senate passed the <u>Sunshine Protection Act</u> which would have permanently activated daylight saving time, but it did not become law, because it was not approved by the U.S. House of Representatives.
- On February 9, 1942, President Franklin Roosevelt instituted year-round DST, called "War Time". It lasted until the last Sunday (the 30th) in September 1945.
- By 1962, the transportation industry found the lack of consistency confusing enough to push for federal regulation. The result was the <u>Uniform Time Act</u> of 1966, signed by President Lyndon Johnson on April 14.
- In 1986 Congress amended the <u>Uniform Time Act</u> by changing the beginning of DST from last Sunday in April to the first Sunday in April and having the end remain the last Sunday in October. These start and end dates were in effect from 1987 to 2006.
- From 2015 to present day, several state and federal representatives have advanced legislation in support of the legalization of using daylight saving time as the year-round clock option. Bills have been introduced in more than 30 states to end DST or make it permanent. None have passed in Congress.
- Because of Hawaii's tropical latitude, there is little variation in daylight length between winter and summer. Hawaii has never observed daylight saving time under the <u>Uniform Time Act</u>, having opted out of the act's provisions in 1967.
- The correct spelling is daylight saving time and not daylight savings time, as is commonly believed.
- Globally, the only major countries that do not observe some variation of DST are Japan, India, and China.
- Daylight Saving Time was chosen to start at 2 a.m. because it is when the fewest trains were running and it prevents the date from switching to yesterday. Additionally, 2 a.m., is before most shift workers leave for work.
