# Word of the Year: Sanctuary

Every year certain press outlets announce their word of the year. The Oxford University Press word of the year 2024 was "brain rot." Yikes! I never heard that phrase used, but it is surprisingly apt given the fraught nature of the past year.

Looking forward to 2025, I want to propose that Community Church's word of the year might be "Sanctuary." Sanctuary means sacred, or sanctified, place. It can refer to a religious space, but it can mean a place of safety for people or for wildlife. When I think of our local congregation, I imagine that sanctuary might become our word of the year in three different ways:

### 1. Distraught by the threatened



policies of the incoming federal administration, we will need to cultivate an inner sanctuary, a place where we meet God underneath the chaos. Rather than constantly allowing ourselves to be tossed to-and-fro by the churning waves of meanness and discord, we will need to find ways to drop down below the surface, into the calming deep beneath the tumult. I'd call that "sanctuary," the place where, as Meister Eckhart said, "the eye with which I see God is the same eye with which God sees me."

- 2. The physical sanctuary of our church requires repair. Following years of deferred maintenance, the roof is in dire need of replacement. Because of its unique design and dramatic pitch, the project won't be cheap. The Leadership Council and Facilities Committee have been working for months, if not years, to determine the scope of the job, and are now beginning to plan in earnest for a Capital Campaign to raise funds from the congregation to replace the roof and renovate other aspects of our campus. This year, we will take a major step forward in renewing our sanctuary, the beautiful and sacred place where we gather to worship.
- 3. Sanctuary is also something we will be called to offer to others over the coming year. If the promises of the incoming administration are put into effect, many of the most marginalized people in our county will suffer.

## Called to Be a Sanctuary People Jenny Douglas

When Trump was elected in November, I, like so many others, was distraught and dismayed that our country would again choose a president who sowed hate and demonized so many, including immigrants. Dismay turned to anger, and I soon decided it was time to channel that anger into action. I asked myself as a white woman of privilege and a person of faith what I could do to support the people who were going to be most at risk of harm.

Knowing that in Sonoma County our immigrant neighbors are especially vulnerable, I found that action through a coalition started by NBOP's Immigrant Defense Task Force and other organizations to develop a network of resources and services to protect and support our immigrant community. This group has been meeting since November, and I have been representing Community Church to explore the role faith communities can play in mobilizing for immigration defense.

Congregations in Sonoma County and across the country are being called upon to be in solidarity with immigrants who are threatened with deportation. Sanctuary is about putting our faith into action and standing with the most vulnerable members of our community, our neighbors who are facing persecution.

Here are some ways we can be called to work individually and together as a faith community to provide sanctuary ministries that serve and protect immigrants in Sonoma County.

#### 1. Advocacy and Public Witness

We can advocate for policies that end detention and deportation and promote the full dignity and integration of immigrants in our communities. We can engage in local public actions, such as public testimony at board of supervisor's meetings, public support for or against legislation, meetings with elected officials, and letters to the editor.

#### 2. Rapid Response

The Rapid Response Network dispatches legal observers to locations in Sonoma County where ICE or Border Patrol activity is reported. Legal observers record, photograph, and document interactions for use in court. Interested church members can get trained as legal observers.

#### 3. Providing a Welcoming Space

Community Church can provide space for trainings, legal clinics for immigrants, coalition meetings, and publicly demonstrate that we are a welcoming space for all regardless of race, ethnicity, and immigration status.

#### 4. Housing

This is what many people think of when they think of sanctuary, providing a safe refuge and respite housing for an individual or family at immediate risk of deportation. As a faith community we are taking the time to explore and discern if this is a sanctuary ministry, we can offer.

#### 5. Accompaniment

We have already been providing some of this support to refugee families, which can include courtroom accompaniment, access to services, translation, rides, and food and clothing to help those in a period of crisis.

#### 6. Creative Direct Action and Freedom Campaigns

We can join individually or as a congregation with NBOP and other groups to participate in non-violent protests if there are mass deportation events.

I hope some of you will feel called to participate in one or more of these sanctuary ministries. ## Sanctuary Roof Update

"The sky's the limit- if you have a roof over your head." – Sol Hurok

At Sunday worship you may pause to admire the tall, unique shape of the sanctuary's wooden, tongue and groove ceiling. The ceiling can recall the inside of a ship's keel - a fitting symbol for the spiritual journey we all embark on. Outdoors, we see the outside of the keel-like roof: a flat roof towards the base, rising vertically to the top. As you look, you may also notice signs of wear – slipping shingles which appear to sag in places.

Tom Terry and Gary Leucht (of the Facilities Committee) have provided more background information about our sanctuary roof. The first keel-roof was installed in the late 1960's and the second (current) roof went up sometime in the aught's. Like all structures, the roof has aged over time and is beginning to show signs of wear. The past roofer used an unfortunate shingle material comprised of 2-layers. The dual layers are beginning to "de-laminate" and fail due to our vertical roof shape. In addition, signs of dry rot were recently discovered on the north side of the building.

These multiple issues have created a need to assess the remaining life of the roof, and the most cost -efficient plan for addressing the dry rot and sagging shingles as one project ... in other words, it may be time for a new roof. Because of the unique, steep roof design, scaffolding will be required for any roof project, and this makes for an expensive roof (most likely, over \$150,000). The Leadership Council is currently considering next steps, including inspections, bids, and various funding sources, including a capital campaign.

More updates will be forthcoming, with a goal of preventing potential water damage from an aging roof (to date, no substantial water damage has been discovered). Stay tuned...

The Outreach Committee would like to thank everyone for participating in the Christmas Outreach Projects this year!

Our committee did several huge shopping trips to Dollar Tree. Shopping for 50 bags at once is a challenging, fun and funny experience. At one of the stores, the manager told us how important receiving a gift bag was to her years ago when she was homeless.

This project is a lot of work at a busy time of the year but everyone on the committee realizes it is an important outreach and gets into the spirit of getting it done with joy. Special thanks to the members of the Outreach Committee for shopping, the Youth Group for packing the bags, the other helpful elves who pitched in and the delivery crew!
