A Bountiful Table

In the church, the calendar year begins with Epiphany on January 6. For centuries, the Christian church heaped Epiphany with meaning upon meaning. It was the 12th and culminating day of Christmas. It was Día de los Reyes when people gave charitable gifts in honor of the magi. The church celebrated Christ's baptism on Epiphany, and retold the story of Jesus' first miraculous act, the transformation of water into wine at Cana. Despite all these emphases, most of us scarcely notice the importance of the day, and January 6 has taken on an ominous meaning in recent years.

This year, January will be full, fun, and fraught. Consider that the Presidential Inauguration will happen on the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday. The ceremony will take place at the Capitol building where a violent mob sought to overthrow the peaceful transfer of power in 2021. At the opposite end of the National Mall is the Lincoln Memorial where Dr. King gave his famous "I Have Dream" speech,



calling Americans to overcome the enduring sins of racism and classism.

The day before, on January 19, our congregation will gather for its Annual Meeting to elect new congregational leaders, to pass a budget enabling our ministry and mission for the coming year, and to consider a proposal to launch a capital campaign in the fall to replace our sanctuary roof and to complete other projects that will make our facility an effective resource for ministry into the coming decades.

As we approach the coming month, I want to invite you to consider the image on the front page of this month's Salt + Light. Taken by Reena Burton, the photo is of a table set by our church's Confirmation Class last November, on the day the class discussed religious diversity. We talked about the three major branches of Christianity. We considered the similarities and differences between Hinduism and Buddhism. We explored why Muslims, Christians, and Jews are called "People of the Book." We discussed religious symbols, sacred texts, important people, traditions, and art. OWL WHOLE LIVES SEXUALITY EDUCATION FOR OLDER ADULTS

Michael Ost and I are excited to offer a 2025 workshop series titled "Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education for Older Adults". That's right -- OWL is not just for kids! We completed 19 hours of OWL facilitator training in September which prepares us to present a program around issues of sexuality in older adults. We care greatly for what this wonderful program provides and want to share it with our own beloved church community. Michael and I are both in the older adult 50+ category and work well together, so it is a good facilitator fit. You may think "what more can I learn about sexuality at my age?" Good question. Sexuality is a topic that evolves with time including gender identity/roles, sexual orientation, boundaries & consent, values & attitudes, the loss of an intimate partner, dating as an older adult, safe practices, dealing with health issues and more. Our workshop will incorporate the most up to date information and be fun & interactive with the participants. No lectures!

We plan to offer five Sunday workshops from January through May. They will be once a month from 11:20-1:20 with a 10 minute break midway for snacks and the restroom. We can take up to 14 participants and ask that you commit to all of the sessions so that we can build a safe space with each other. The first session on January 12 is especially important. If you can't make that date then we ask that you do not sign up for this round. Sign-ups are available on Realm or in person.

DREAMS: GOD'S FORGOTTEN LANGUAGE

This six-week Faith Formation class will be held on January 5,12, 26 and February 2, 9, and 16. The class will focus on biblical dreams from the Old and New Testament along with discussion of how Ancient cultures viewed dreams. We will relate dreams like Jacob's "ladder dream" and his "wrestling with God dream" to modern day psychological understanding of human growth and development.

Class #1 will introduce basic rules for doing dream work, the types of dreams found in the bible and concepts like Dream Time, dream incubation, precognitive dreams, shadow dreams, lucid dreaming, telepathic dreams, mutual dreams, and dreams of death.

Class #2 will present Jungian Psychological Terms, the ego-SELF Axis, and an exploration of Jacob's "ladder" dream and what it has to teach us about our own inner journey toward the Divine.

Class #3 will explore what it means to wrestle with God and our own inner shadow.

Class #4 will present the story of Joseph, the Egyptian concept of the dream world and how to interpret dreams.

Class #5 will present the concept of dream telepathy by looking at Daniel's interpretation of King Nebuchadnezzar's dreams.

Class #6 will focus on dreams of death and precognition and a summary of the six Weeks.


Mary is a Clinical Psychologist and has taught this class in other churchers over the past 40 years.
