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From the Pastor

A few years ago, Theodore W. Loder shared this Easter reflection: "Easter is an affirmation of our deepest intuitions, our simple, child-like Yes to life and our insistent No to death. Easter tells us we can trust out burning hearts. Listen to the fire in your heart. What does its say you are? Doesn't it say something like this? 'I am alive, I am a miracle of life itself. I am a miracle of God. Deeper than all my guilt and fear, I am able to give and receive love. I am valuable. I am part of creation. I am not meant for death while I live, or when I die. I am meant to live, to create, to grow, to expand, nurture, cherish life and not be afraid or indifferent, but passionate and compassionate.' Easter is an affirmation of that Yes - that heart on fire in you. Trust it. Live it... nothing less."

It occurs to me that Easter is nothing less than an invitation to become part of what I have heard described as "the resurrection conspiracy." This is a conspiracy that refuses to accept reality and truth as defined by the world around us. Rather it chooses to believe that there is a reality that transcends our intellects; that there is a God who can make a way where there is no way; that there is a reality stronger and more real than the harshness and finality of death; that there is a truth bigger than our human reason, a truth that transcends our ability to understand, a truth that flies in the face of the reality we experience and read about in the newspaper or on line.

Easter is a conspiracy because it takes the assumptions of conventional wisdom and blows them to pieces. It subverts most of what we have taught about life and reality and truth. Think about it. If Jesus is raised from the dead, if he is alive, then we have to rethink everything we ever thought we knew about what is possible. We can't go back to normal because there is no normal. We can't even trust the darkness.

Words of a John Updike poem come to mind: "Let us not mock God with metaphor / analogy, sidestepping transcendence... / let us walk through the door." Pretty radical stuff this Easter. There really is no going back. So together let us dare to "walk through the door" into a whole new world.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

We took a small step backwards financially in February. Operating expenses exceeded operating income by \$1,400 leaving us with a two month operating

deficit of \$4,200.

Pledge income was steady, although it did fall a couple of thousand dollars behind our projections and use of facilities income was strong. Income from loose offerings declined however. Actual pledges for the year total \$278,139 for the operating fund which is \$6,861 below or budget goal. A number of you have made verbal commitments but not yet made a concrete pledge. 

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THE HISTORY OF CAMP CAZADERO: CAZADERO CAMP BEGINNINGS PART IV by Sara Gerboth

We ate in the ranch house dining room, sharing stories of the burnt beans, the dishes on the tables, and the casket under the dorm.

We didn't sleep in the dormitory rooms, which were still full of belongings left behind, but threw our sleeping bags on the floor in the living room of the dorm where we had built a fire in the big stone fireplace. Fortunately, we had electricity and running water, but no hot water. We pulled off our muddy clothes in the bathroom and dressed in dry clothes to sleep in. Most of us girls wet our hair and rolled it up into pin curls all over our heads, as we did every night, then wrapped them in bandanas to cover the pin curls. We were shy at first about wearing pin curls and bandanas around the boys, but we were all so excited about sleeping in the same room with boys that we got over it guickly. Jim Senter slept with all the kids. well, tried to sleep. He had the boys, who were all on one side of the room, sing Good Night Ladies to the girls, and then the girls, who were all on the other side, sing, Tell Me Why the Stars Do Shine to the boys, and then he settled down to sleep - or to try to sleep. We talked on into the wee hours, scaring each other by making up creepy stories about the people that had lived and maybe died there. We all reveled in this new experience of sleeping together. The adults, except for Jim, slept in the ranch house.

The April Easter Work Camp of youth from all over Northern California went well, and things were readied for summer camps. Thirty-five to forty teens and adults spent a back breaking and soul-searching week. Tools and tack and manure were cleaned out of the barn to prepare it to be the boys' dorm. City kids that had never used an outhouse were now digging them - "holy holes on the hill." They had to dispose of old food, garbage, worn old furniture and rugs. They built a huge bonfire in the meadow and threw in old furniture and rugs and everything else that could not be salvaged. Everything was so wet that spring that nobody worried about fire getting out of control. Several weekend antique sales between Easter and summer helped dispose of the good furniture, including dressers, chairs and double beds, many of them Victorian antiques. It was right at the end of World War II, and the money was used to

purchase 'war surplus' equipment to furnish the rooms and the barn-dorm, including surplus army bunk beds and an old army truck to haul equipment and campers. Victorians were replaced with the army's best.

The first camp was in June, 1945, with the war still going, and there was still rationing of meat, sugar and gasoline. Every camper had to bring their own plate, cup, bowl, silverware, a pound of sugar, and red ration stamps for meat. The camp staff had arranged with the local butcher to buy the meat, but were stunned when the meat was delivered to camp on the hoof, six fat steers. They were pastured in the meadow until, one by one, they were butchered and stored in the local frozen food locker in Cazadero. Wim Meyer said it just about killed him to order all the beef ground into hamburger or cut into stew, but steak and roast were not camp fare.

Getting to the camp was a bit more challenging for some than for others. The Greyhound bus dropped off campers, crew, and ministers at the Pink Elephant bar in Monte Rio. People could wait on the bench in front for pick-up by the old stake-sided army truck. They rode in back up the long, dusty, twisting road to Caz.

Campers were surprised to find out that there was a telephone at the camp located in the kitchen. The single uninsulated wire was strung to the town of Cazadero (about 7 miles) from one tree to another, on porcelain insulators. It was a 20-party line, that ran through the meat market in Cazadero. The butcher mediated arguments about who got the party line next.

During that first summer, the boys slept in the barn and the girls slept in Redwood Lodge. Early on the first day of summer camp, the cook sighted a rattlesnake just outside the kitchen door. She hurriedly honked the emergency horn and all the crew members came running. A crew member killed the rattle snake, and tried to calm the campers that had gathered.
