### February: Metamorphosis

Because **Easter** is a moveable feast (the Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after March 21, the spring equinox), the season of **Lent** (40 days plus 6 Sundays preceding Easter) begins earlier or later based on the date of Easter. Because **Ash Wednesday** (the first day of Lent) changes, the season of **Epiphany** (which begins on January 6) can last between 4 and 9 weeks. This year, Epiphany lasts 6 weeks, ending on February 15, the last Sunday before Lent, also known as **Transfiguration Sunday**.

The word “Transfiguration” comes from a story common to the synoptic Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Jesus goes up on a mountain with a few of his disciples and his true identity as

God’s child is revealed to them. In this story, the Greek word translated as “transfigured” is *metamorphoó*. I think it is poetic that right here near the beginning of a new year, at the culmination of the season of Epiphany, the story we tell is one of metamorphosis. What we thought we understood and could control now reveals itself to us as deeper mystery and a more fruitful challenge that we could have anticipated.



With this idea of a mysterious metamorphosis in mind, I want to reflect on a few aspects of our life together as a congregation to provide something of an update, but also to share how I interpret the time in which we find ourselves.

- At the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in January, we passed a 2026 budget that does not include funding for an Associate Minister position. Because we landed about \$85,000 short of our pledge goal, and because our rental income has decreased over the past two years, it did not make sense to include a budget line we could not afford.
- While disappointing, the reality is that our Associate Minister Search Committee, which formed in June of last year, has looked at only six ministerial profiles, only three of which warranted an initial interview, and only one of which might have been a good fit. That candidate

backed out of a second interview because they decided they were not prepared to move their family. This tracks with a national trend that people are not relocating, especially not to expensive regions such as Sonoma County.

- In the meantime, our congregation is experiencing one of the most successful and generous periods in our church's history, having gathered intent cards totaling \$883,493 toward our \$1.2M 3-year capital campaign goal, and an additional \$400,671 toward our 2026 Local Church & Outreach budget, for a total of \$1,284,164. What a faithful response and a major achievement.
- With regard to the Capital Campaign and the projects we intend for it to fund, the Leadership Council, with support from the Finance Committee, is working to determine how best to pay off the \$425,000 loan our church took out so that we could complete work on the sanctuary roof before the rainy season began. Additionally, a Capital Projects Team will need to form to begin the work of prioritizing projects that were part of the campaign prospectus, receiving bids from contractors, and authorizing the work to begin. Also, a Facilities Maintenance Plan Task Force will be drafting a comprehensive, long-term plan that will help us shift from reactive repairs to pro-active maintenance.
- Finally, we are going into a new governance year in the life of our congregation with an open seat on the Leadership Council. My sense is that last fall's Capital Campaign was a heavy, and successful, lift for our congregation, and there is some understandable fatigue among volunteers. A question I have for the year to come is, "How do we make ministry humane, sustainable, and life-giving for volunteers and staff alike?" Another is, "What less important things can we say 'no' to so that we say a whole-hearted yes to more important things?"

On the Mount of Transfiguration, the disciples were terrified. What they were seeing and hearing was not what they had expected. Moses and Elijah suddenly appeared out of nowhere. A cloud descended. A great light shone. A voice boomed from the cloud. They had not signed up for any of this. And yet there they were, bathed in the glow of a transformational moment, a metamorphosis that would change them, change their community, and change their world. What would you do in light of such a bewildering experience? Step-by-step, you walk back down into the world you are called to love.

## OPEN DOORS

"I've always been involved with kind of edgy things," Tirza shares. "The adventure has woven in and out of my spirituality my whole life." As a child, she lived in a Christian commune with no running water or electricity, where her first memories are of making food together and gathering in community. As an adult, she carried that spirit forward by creating a peace-based activist circus in San Francisco, choreographing large-scale performances, teaching yoga and Ayurveda, and leading others into spiritual practice through movement, ritual, and service.

Before coming to Community Church, that same adventurous spirit was forged by years of intense responsibility and care.

Tirza raised two children largely on her own, including a son with significant special needs who requires "24/7 care. There's no stopping. There's no break," while she navigated a toxic marriage, built a business by necessity, and held her family together through years of instability. "My son is my greatest teacher," she shared. "He shaped who I am, what it means to really support somebody who exists outside of what we consider the norm."

In 2020, both of her children moved to Southern California. Tirza found herself traveling back and forth monthly, carrying love, responsibility, and grief, while quietly asking what her life was becoming now that survival was no longer the only task.

Community Church entered her life gently, through relationship. She had been around the grounds for years, using the kitchen for Ayurvedic cooking and attending her daughter's basketball games, but it wasn't until she helped a client get to church that she stayed herself. "I was really struck by Pastor Ben's sermon," she said. "He was speaking truths I really felt." With a history of Christian trauma, stepping into a church was not easy, yet she found herself feeling unexpectedly at home.

Dreams of entering seminary had first come into view years earlier, when her children were small. "I quickly realized that was insane," she says, laughing. It was only later, when her children were living in Southern California, that she had the space, and a nudge from a dear friend, to feel the timing was right to say yes.

As part of her seminary program, Community Church opened its doors. What began as an internship soon grew into deeper involvement and a role in faith formation. "Every single conversation here is about giving," Tirza said. "How can we help? How can we support? That's my language."

Today, Tirza describes her life as shaped less by crisis and more by meaning. She is healing her relationship with God and Jesus, becoming "a baby again" in faith, trusted and held during a time of transformation. Moments like baptisms feel especially sacred. "From the indigenous lineage I study, the holy waters are the holder of the Holy Spirit," she shared. "Everything we do with the water is so so so sacred. Each baptism is the deepest honor."

At Community Church, her years of parenting, caregiving, and resilience now fuel a larger purpose: helping create sanctuary and community for neurodiverse kids like her son. "Parents can't do it alone," she said. "We need teams. We need community." Community Church is a stepping stone on that path, a place where survival has softened into contribution, and where a life shaped by care is being trusted, nurtured, and shared.




